TRAILING \$2,000,000 BUCKETSHOP SPOILS

Chicago Attorney for 3,000 Victims Confers with District Attorney in New York Formulate Raiding Plan.

New York, July 13—Philip R. Davis, a Chicago attorney, has arrived here on the trial of \$2,000,000 worth of securities which he seeks to reclaim for about 3,000 Chicago and Mid-Western creditors of five failed Chicago-New York brokerage houses, suspected of "bucketing." Mr. Davis admitted that he was still "one step behind" the securities he is after. As a side issue to his trip Mr. Davis conferred with District Attorney Joseph H. Barton on a plan to have Mr. Barton's office and the office of Illinois State's Attorney Crowe work together to suppress spurious brokerage firms.

In addition to representing the several thousand creditors, Mr. Davis is working in co-operation with James A. Davis, head of the Advertisers and Investors Protective Bureau of the Chicago Association of Commerce, and with A. G. Davis, Secretary of the Securities Division of the Illinois State Department. The various Davises are not related.

"The Chicago Association of Commerce," said Philip R. Davis at the Hotel Pennsylvania yesterday, "has been very active in cleaning up violations of the 'blue sky' law, and now that that work has been virtually completed they have turned their attention to the job of ridding the city of the bucket shop. The bucket shop evil has grown tremendously."

"I talked to District Attorney Barton this noon and laid before him a tentative plan to obtain closer co-operation between his office and our officials out in Chicago. Under the New York State law the officials can not raid a house while it is doing business, although the officials may have reason to believe that things are not being conducted as they should be."

"Under the law out in Chicago, however, we can go right in and grab them. But after what we have done so far, we have been informed by the people in the office that all their books and other records were in their branch or main offices in New York. What we aim to do is to arrange some sort of system that will enable us out in Chicago to tip off New York that we plan to raid such and such a firm and when we do so have a raid staged simultaneously here. In that way we hope to nab the essential records."

"I have traced about \$2,000,000 worth of securities which I hope to reclaim. The batch I am seeking just now was eventually traced to this city. One of the reclamation editions that I have with me is for \$38,000 alone. In tracing these things I have found instances where securities were split fifteen different ways, under assumed names and with new numbers. That made the work of following them a rather complicated job."

PRAIRIES TO BOSTON

School Inspector's Lengthy Motor Run to Convention. (Montreal Gazette.)

After motoring all the way from Weyburn, Sask., to Boston to attend the annual convention of the National Education Association, which ended on Saturday last, Alfred Kennedy, M. A., inspector of schools at Weyburn, reached Montreal last night in his Ford car on his way home to the west. He was accompanied by his brother, Thomas Kennedy, head of the mathematical department of Oakwood Collegiate Institute, Toronto, and both expressed themselves as highly pleased with the results of the convention. It was attended by more than twelve thousand delegates, a number that would have been considerably greater, Alfred Kennedy stated, had it not been for the disorganization of train service caused by the railroad men's strike. Mr. Kennedy said that the association's membership is now well over 116,000, with a very satisfactory proportion of this in Canada.

Mr. Kennedy left Weyburn on June 19, accompanied by his wife and five-year-old daughter, Betty, and traveled to Toronto, where he left his wife and child and continued the journey with his brother. His route lay through Sas-

BEE-STING SURE FOR RHEUMATISM

Wonders Have Been Effected According to Reports.

London, July 8.—(By Mail)—A remarkable revival of the honey bee faith in the efficacy of bee stings as the sole infallible cure for rheumatism, rheumatoid, arthritis, and sciatica, is in progress here. There new movement has swept before it all scientific and pseudo-scientific prejudices, and Bishop Stortford may not unjustly claim to rank as a veritable "bee clinic" for the treatment of rheumatic disorders.

No previous experiment with the method can compare with the new development for extent or seriousness. Rumors of the wonders effected have spread far and wide, and orders are pouring in from London for consignments of bee swarms, among the applicants, I understand, being St. Bartholomew's Hospital.

Bishop Stortford is one of the most considerable apical centres in the kingdom, and Mr. E. P. Hussey, secretary of the local Beekeepers' Association, is one of the most experienced of apiculturists. The bees are carefully placed on the nose of the sufferer's neck," he said, "in this way they can discharge the venom in their sting most effectively into the body."

The Victoria and the Cordova made several ineffectual attempts to pull the Williamette into deep water. The Williamette was en route from San Francisco to Seattle.
