TWO BRIDES LOST ON HONEYMOON

Sisters Married Brothers—
Trapped By Woman in Big
Touring Car.

Amherst, Ohio, March 31.—Mrs. Ma Hetzell, 18 years of age, and Mrs. Ma Hetzell, 20, sisters who recently married Henry and Jacob Hetzell, of Atlanta, Michigan, have mysteriously disappeared, the bridegrooms reported to the local police for the brides in this city and wedding towns proved futile. The newly married couples were on automobile honeymoon trip to visit relatives of the brides at North Jackson, near here, according to the story told the police. Soon after passing Akron, their car was stopped by a woman standing beside a big touring car who appealed to the men to change a tire for her, which she said had blown out. As the men worked, the women chatted together. When the tire was changed the woman suggested the brides to ride with her, saying she was lonely. The big car sped away from the unsuspecting husbands, whose fears were first aroused when they reached North Jackson and found no one who had seen the automobile containing the three women.

WASHED PEPPER INTO MAN'S FACE

McGraw was acknowledged a "good morning" from a neighbor woman, who passed him at the same time as did Mrs. Kelsey. The latter, it is said, thought the man was addressing her, and opening a satchel, threw the pepper suddenly.






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
