The overseas mills will close here at 4 p. m. tomorrow for the steamship Wilhelm via Quebec.

George Phair of Newcastle, an inmate of the Boys' Industrial Home at East St. John, has escaped from that institution. The police of other places have been notified to watch for him. He is thought to have gone towards Moncton.

Robert Crawford of this city, provincial constable; S. P. Chapman of Amherst and Leonard S. Hutchison of Dorchester were the applicants for the position of chief of police of Moncton to succeed George A. Rideout. Mr. Hutchison, who was appointed chief by the council, will take charge tomorrow. His salary will be \$2,000 a year.

Ex-President W. H. Taft writing from Pointe au Pic on September 18, sent the following communication to C. W. Romans, secretary of the Canadian Club: "My Dear Sir—I have your kind invitation to address the Canadian Club of St. John, New Brunswick, and thank the club for it. I have no present expectation of being in St. John and am so engaged in the arbitration proceedings between the Canadian government and the Grand Trunk Railway system as to make it unlikely that I could come to you during the next year.  Sussex, N. J., Sept. 20.—A cat belonging to Ford Ewald, a farmer near here, decided to treat himself to a bit of chicken the other day. Unfortunately for himself, he picked out a guinea rooster, a most pugnacious bird. Ewald declared that the fight lasted for about nine minutes, with the cat losing one of its lives every minute. At the beginning of the tenth minute the pussy granted hoarsely and rolled over dead, while the rooster pruned himself and strode proudly away, surrounded by admiring chickens.

IRON FIELDS IN PHILIPPINES
 Washington, Sept. 20.—The finest unworked iron fields in the world have been discovered in the Philippines, according to a report from the government experts just received here. The quantities of ore adjacent to good harbors, they state, will be sufficient to assure the future of iron and steel production in the United States for generations.

MAN STOWAWAYS.
 New York, Sept. 20.—Practically every steamer which arrives from Europe brings new members for the "Stowaways' Club at Ellis Island. There are now some ninety stowaways at the detention quarters there awaiting deportation.

BAN SALE OF STILLS EXCEPT FOR DISTILLING WATER.
 Washington, Sept. 20.—The sale of stills is being restricted. An order has been issued requiring that all purchasers of stills file affidavits that they will be used only for the distilling of water. Unless such affidavits are filed it will be held that the stills have been sold for illicit purposes. The order was issued as a result of reports of great traffic in stills.

STRATFORD ENJOYS PAVEMENT DANCE

Community Entertainment to Raise Funds for Memorial.

Stratford, Ont., Sept. 20.—Community dance and promenade held on the new pavement of the main streets, will net some thousands of dollars for the Soldiers' Memorial Fund. Ontario Street from the Court House to Waterloo Street was roped off and citizens and out of town visitors by the thousands danced and promenaded to the music of two brass bands while a refreshment booth in front of the Post Office did a rushing business. The dance was under the patronage of the Retail Merchants' Association and the John MacDonald Chapter of the I. O. D. E., and the marked opening of the new pavement. The entire proceeds go to the Soldiers' Memorial Fund. The girls of the I. O. D. E. Chapter sold the admission badges and the crowds entered arches erected at the various street intersections. The stores were decorated, flags and bunting strung across the streets and every light possible turned on, making a brilliant scene.

DESPERATE BATTLE WITH MASKED MEN

Bandits Attack House to Steal 200 Cases of Liquor.

Windsor, Sept. 20.—Six masked men, who attempted to steal 200 cases of liquor from the residence of Frank Belleperche, Sandwich East Township, nine miles east of Windsor, were driven off after a rifle and revolver battle lasting more than an hour. Francis Gignac, Petite Cote, is being held at Ford in connection with the shooting. Armed with shotgun and rifle, Belleperche and his son held off the raiders until the arrival of Provincial Officers Smith and Hannah and members of the Ford police department. The party, abandoning two automobiles, which were perforated with bullet holes and splattered with blood, escaped by running through a corn field. Telephone wires in the vicinity were cut and it was some time before the police could be summoned.

DETROIT TEACHERS WILL BUILD HOTEL

Plan of Association to Avoid High Prices of Profiteering Landlords.

Detroit, Sept. 20.—Driven by high rents and restaurant prices, the Detroit Teachers' Association with soon erect or purchase a co-operative hotel. The sentiment of the last year, during which teachers were compelled to pay as high as \$12 a week for small rooms and proportionate prices for meals, has crystallized in an effort to avoid landlord profiteers permanently, and a special committee of the association has been called to plan a search for suitable sites.

Preference of the teachers as to sites will be given a hearing, and if the association does not decide on a centrally located hotel or club house it will acquire a number of residences throughout the city and convert them into teachers' homes.

Co-operative dining-rooms, designed to fit the needs of the teachers, will be one of the special aims of the committee working on the project.

PRISONERS RUN STILL ON CORN BREAD IN JAIL.
 Lexington, Sept. 20.—A crude but complete distillery, operated by seven white prisoners, was found in the county jail at Henderson. The still had been made from a coal oil can, with a smaller can beneath to hold fire. The men used sour corn bread which they saved from a siphon they had torn up a new disinfectant spray and inserted it in the top of the oil can. Fire was made from torn up blankets in the small can, and was the rag smoke that led to the discovery.

ENGLISH OAK ENDURES.
 Age Seems to Have Little Effect on Its Life

(Detroit News)
 The durability of English oak is the greatest of any known forest timber, discoveries having been made that it is preserved almost as well under water through centuries as it is when shielded by roofs in ancient castles.

Professor Burnett, of London, possessed a piece of English oak from King John's palace at Eithan, perfectly sound and strong, which can be traced back for more than five hundred years. The oak was of Edward the Confessor, more than eight hundred years old. One of the oak coronation chairs in Westminster Abbey has been there for more than five centuries.

In Gloucester Cathedral there are thirty-one stalls of rich tabernacle work executed in oak in the reign of King Alfred, and beautifully perfect. When the foundations of the old Savoy Palace in London, built 700 years previously, were torn down, the piles, many of which were of oak, were found in a state of perfect soundness. A vessel, found in the river Rother, in Kent, said to date back to the time of King Alfred, was found to be sound, despite the fact that the oak keel had been buried in the mud. An oak boat was found near Brigg in an almost perfect condition, despite the fact that it was nearly two hundred years old.

NEW 16-INCH SHELL PIERCES 14-IN. ARMOR

Washington, Sept. 20.—On the heels of news that the Navy Department had successfully directed all movements of an 11,000 ton battleship by radio, it is learned that the department perfected a 16-inch shell which pierced 14-inch plate armor at an angle of ten degrees. The feat was made possible by the invention of an explosive of tremendous energy and by special constrictions of the head of the shell.
