

FREE DISPENSARY AND DIET KITCHEN ARE ADVOCATED

A free dispensary, a diet kitchen and readings against a local bakery were principal matters dealt with at the thirty meeting of the Board of Health yesterday afternoon in the board rooms of the city hall.

Mr. G. A. Kuhring appeared before the board and asked their co-operation in establishing a diet kitchen. The board assented to his request and the matter will be referred to the city council.

Mr. George Scott came before the board in connection with a recommendation that a free dispensary be established. He stated that the minister of public health had agreed to hold a meeting in the future and the matter will be brought before him then.

Mr. Edmund Fiewelling, food inspector, gave a report to the board on the sanitary condition of one of the local bakeries. Proceedings were ordered to be taken against the bakery.

The Victorian Order of Nurses submitted their monthly report on Child Welfare.

Mr. Brophy made a report on the tuberculosis cases looked after by her. T. Fred Johnston, dairy and food inspector, submitted his monthly report. He made a report on the slaughterhouse examined in his district. Proceedings are to be taken against ten milk producers by preventing their milk from coming to this district.

Mr. Abramson reported that four stations of the city water had been examined since the last meeting and that everything was satisfactory in that respect.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND DISTRICT NURSING

A post-graduate course in public health district nursing will be given in connection with the St. John branch of the Victorian Order of Nurses in co-operation with the New Brunswick branch of the Canadian Red Cross. Two courses of four months each will be given during 1921. Nurses taking this course will be at the Victoria Order Home and receive \$25 per month on completion of course. Nurses are expected to give their service to the province at a minimum salary of \$115 per month. All nurses wishing to enter for this course will apply at once to the Victorian Order Home, 88 Carleton street, St. John. Lectures will begin on Dec. 21.

LIFE JUSTICE IS TRIED FOR MURDER

Leviand, O. Dec. 17.—One month after the day after he appeared as principal witness for the prosecution at the trial of John W. Joyce, charged with the murder of Harold C. Joyce, William H. McGinnon, chief justice of the municipal court, went on trial with the same crime. Joyce will be the principal witness for the state. Judge McGinnon was indicted after a day-long investigation of the case, which was the day after Joyce, a former town saloon-keeper, was acquitted of a murder.

Forty witnesses will be called by the state. Kacy was shot early May 8, after automobile ride with Joyce and McGinnon.

SCORE OF TAX CASES IN COURT

Twenty citizens appeared before the magistrate yesterday afternoon charged with having failed to send returns, showing their income, to the income tax office. Those who were charged were: Herman Stravits, Humphrey Sheehan, James Pullen, Thomas J. Phillips, Frank Scott, A. Perchank, H. L. MacGowan, Leonard Dryden, J. P. Loney, Dr. B. J. Brudrick, J. F. Belyea, Frank Fishman, Hilton Belyea, Harry Belyea, Roy Bell, Oliver Aikie, Robert Armstrong, Stanley Williams, William Baxter, Colby Smith, F. D. Stevens, Percy E. Howard, George Clark and Peter Campbell.

L. P. D. Tilley appeared for the prosecution. The majority of the accused had appeared before and had pleaded guilty. Frank Fishman said that he had been sick and that there must be some mistake, although it was said he had been served with notices from the department at Ottawa three separate times in 1919, as shown by the evidence of Hedy C. Wilson, an accountant at the tax inspector's office. The accused pleaded not guilty at first but eventually admitted that he had not made out a return.

The four last named are to appear again on Dec. 28. All the others had the minimum fine of \$100 struck against them, although the penalty is that amount for each day the return is overdue after notification. All are to appear on Dec. 28, by which time the Magistrate will be advised as to whether the fines will be allowed to stand against the accused or whether it will be ordered paid.

HOME RULE BILL ISSUE SETTLED

London, Dec. 17.—The possibility of conflict between the House of Lords and the House of Commons over the Irish home rule bill has been averted. The amendments to the measure made by the lower house were discussed in the upper chamber today and all were disposed of in a manner that will permit the measure becoming a law tomorrow.

BURIED IN GRAIN; HAD NARROW ESCAPE

One of the stewards on the steamer Scotian at No. 2 pier, Sand Point, came uncomfortably close to death yesterday afternoon when, while passing along between decks, he fell into the grain in the hold. He was buried by the heavy stream coming from the chute and only the quick action of his mates, in having the stream of wheat stopped at once, saved the man from being smothered and crushed to death. As it was, he had been buried sufficiently to cut off his wind and to crush him so that he required the assistance of a companion to climb out of the hold.

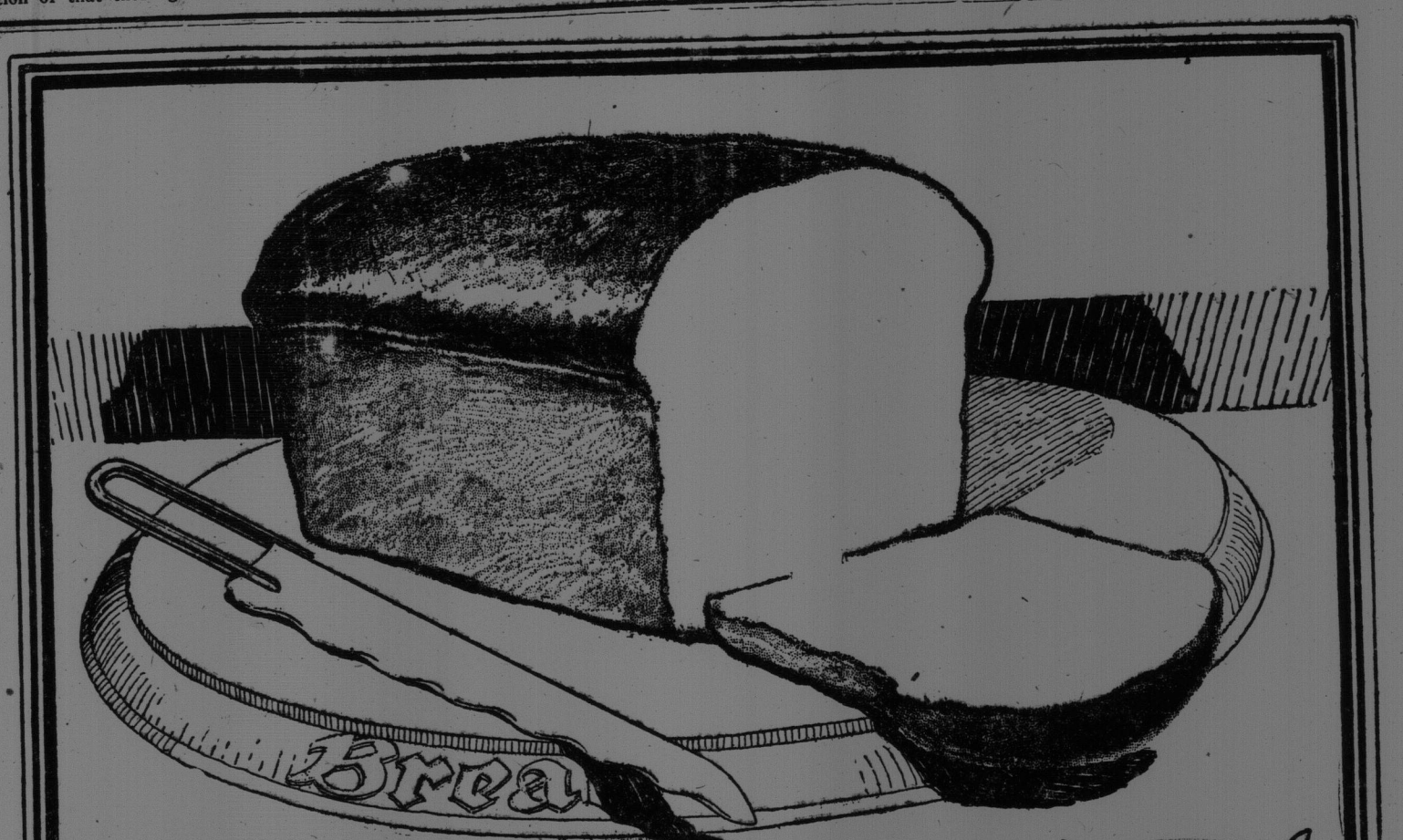

A telegram from F. W. Burnham, president of the United Christian Missionary Society, the headquarters of which are at St. Louis, to a friend in this city yesterday, announced the death of Archibald McLean, vice-president of the society. Mr. McLean was a native of P. E. Island. He was one of the most prominent missionary workers in America and had travelled extensively in connection with his work. He was in St. John about five years ago and Mr. Burnham accompanied him at that time. His whole life was devoted to missionary endeavor and he was an inspiration to those associated with him. He had attended many conventions of importance in America and abroad.

Mr. McLean was unmarried. He leaves many relatives in P. E. Island, his father having died there some time ago at an advanced age. A funeral service will be held in St. Louis tomorrow and burial will take place in Cincinnati (O.) on Monday.

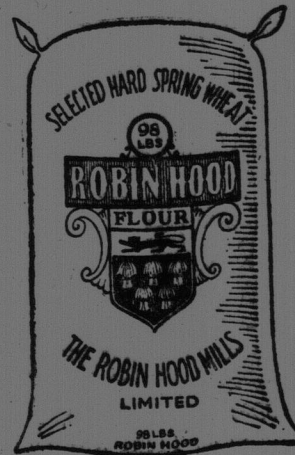
