MISS SMITH WILL WORK FOR MINIMUM WAGE, FAIR RENTALS, AND BONUS FOR THE SERVICE MEN

(N. Y. Evening Post.)

Marguerite L. Smith, age twenty-five, B.S., 1916, M.A., 1918, Teachers' College, Columbia University, instructor and supervisor of Girl Scouts and other club work at Horace Mann School, leader in every movement in her own district that may be of service or benefit to her constituents, that is in part the service record of Miss Smith, who was recently elected to represent the Nineteenth Assembly District in the State Legislature at Albany.

At first thought this seems a big job for a girl of twenty-five to tackle, but when one has talked to Miss Smith for a few moments one realizes that her accomplishments are but the first expressions of what is surely an unusually great capacity for service—a capacity that betokens a wonderfully interesting career. When interviewed during a leisure moment at school it was surprising to find Miss Smith a little girl who looked hardly more than eighteen. She came forward and announced herself, and with poise and assurance quietly said:—

"Please wait in here a moment, I must finish these statistics."

Statistics! A real live, earnest brain behind those laughing brown eyes? Well, it seemed impossible, but it was true. And her eyes can be serious too. Those men and women who opposed equal suffrage so bitterly, who believed no woman could be really feminine and engage in politics, will be chagrined indeed when they see Miss Smith, for she is "of the female, feminine," dainty, refined, yet abundantly vital, a lover of athletics, but not without athletic and yet without possessing and using to excellent advantage a keen, incisive brain. One immediately puts Miss Smith down as having for her motto: "Service to others—service without stint or limit."

The Nineteenth Assembly District, which Miss Smith now represents, extends from 118th street to 137th street and from Madison avenue to Eighth avenue, embracing out to include a portion of St. Nicholas avenue. Perhaps in no other district of New York is there such a variety of peoples. All kinds of men and women, representing almost every country in the world live here. In the heart of the district is a large colored population which is for Miss Smith strong. In fact, her extraordinary community work ever since she has been old enough to interest herself in work of this sort has made her one of the best-known residents and one of the most beloved.

To add to this is her record during the war. Her untiring efforts as chairman of the Red Cross Auxiliary in her neighborhood, her successful leadership in all the Allied war drives, her work for the War Camp Community Service in entertaining soldiers, all have won her already rapidly growing popularity. It was she who arranged dances for the boys and doughboys.

Miss Smith said the greatest surprise she ever received was when the telegram came to her announcing her nomination while she was at Camp Hanoum, Theford, Vt. during the summer as physical and hygiene instructor. The telegram came from Irwin Kurtz, who gives himself the credit for having discovered Miss Smith politically. The telegram told her she had been nominated on the Republican ticket for the Assembly. Mr. Kurtz was chairman of Draft Board 170 where Miss Smith contributed her expert knowledge of veins and arteries by taking the blood pressure of prospective soldiers. Her ability in this, as well as various other phases of war work in the community, so impressed Mr. Kurtz that he suggested Miss Smith's name to the Republican leader of the Nineteenth District and she was nominated.

Miss Smith does not intend that her ideals of service shall desert her in the maze of politics. Instead she plans to bring them full tilt to the new work. When she is in Albany she will work for the best interests of the people who sent her there. She will try at all times to find out first what the will of the people is—then abide by it. She is not the position and therefore her vote in any position that comes up must be the will of the Nineteenth Assembly District. She is already hard at work on a card index system listing the various business and professional men in groups according to their business or profession. For example: All the physicians in the district are listed, name and address, the druggists, dentists and business men in different lists according to their business. This is done so that when a bill comes up which, say, for instance, will affect only the grocers, then a notice will be sent to all the grocers in the district calling a meeting to discuss the proposed measure. There will probably be occasions when a vote must be taken before there is sufficient time to call a meeting for discussion. In that case Miss Smith proposes to vote according to her best judgment for the interests of the people she represents.

One of the first issues that will be considered by Assemblyman Smith when in Albany is that of excessive rentals in her district. Miss Smith believes that it is the lessee who has raised the rent, that some method can be devised making a fair rental a legal percentage of the actual value of the house. One of the strongest planks in Miss Smith's platform was that for the returned soldier. Miss Smith feels that in many instances the men who fought for democracy have not received their just dues. She intends to do all in her power to get for them unpaid allotments and back pay. She believes in such a man who gave up their positions to protect their country should have first choice of jobs on their return. Many of these have returned maimed in one way or another that it is impossible for them to hold their former positions and they have also been denied the vocational training promised them by the government. Miss Smith is making it her business to work in behalf of these men. She feels that their mental attitude is in a measure justified and she intends to fight for them to gain recognition from the state.

Miss Smith also believes that the State of New York should give to her returned soldiers the same consideration in the way of a bonus as the State of Massachusetts has recently done. New York, so far from giving to her veterans, and Miss Smith expects to do all she can to see that her state does not take a back seat in this respect. Another of the questions that interests Miss Smith is that of a minimum wage. This is not to apply only to women but to men as well. She believes in equal pay for equal work. The status of the teacher is especially of interest to her. Even though the teacher's wage has been increased from 10 to 15 per cent, Miss Smith maintains that is not sufficient to keep pace with the increased cost of living.

To tell of all this very modern young lady's interests and accomplishments would easily fill a book. It seems almost impossible that so many and so varied number of activities could be crowded into one of her work days. In addition to her political work, which is practically new as yet, Miss Smith has not given up one whit of her district community work. Her school work, too, has continued, although she has been allowed a leave of absence during the time it will be necessary for her to be in Albany.

Miss Smith does not at present plan a future political career for herself, although should her path lie in that direction she will not turn from it. She is continuing her school work because that is the work for which she prepared herself and which she had always believed would be her life work.
