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MRS. HARRIMAN SOUNDS CALL TO ALL MOTHERS TO UNITE IN PROTECTION OF CHILDREN

"Mothers are responsible for the health of their children. We must stand together."

Mrs. Oliver Harriman of New York believes that all mothers, rich and poor alike, must unite in the struggle against a disease which has become a menace to their children.

"Unless we mothers remember the other mothers who are without the means or the knowledge to protect their children, we will see helpless little children growing into men and women burdened with the handicap of disease caused by our neglect."

"Mothers of today are neglectful of their social responsibility toward the children of other mothers who cannot or perhaps do not know how to give their children healthy living conditions. We must teach them that fresh air is not harmful for babies and that good food is necessary if they wish healthy children. You will find them eager to learn and patiently anxious to alleviate bad methods."

"In my welfare work for the children of the poor I have seen many a proof of my statements. I have seen little children fall off their chairs too weak to sit up from the lack of food. In one hospital in which I worked I saw one child come back five times as a starvation case. In one of the homes which I visited, the mother brought her baby for me to see. It looked so pale and thin that I cried in astonishment. 'What do you give your baby to eat?' 'I give her coffee,' she said. 'It braces her up.' Poor baby—at the age of six months a diet of coffee had almost killed it!"

Dr. Copeland tells me that out of 19,000 children who were examined one-third of them were under weight, ill-nourished and tubercular. Malnutrition cases generally lead to tuberculosis. The disease is not inherited and it is curable. I think preventive measures are the best. We are neglecting our children shamefully—and we will pay the price when they grow up into discontented citizens. To give help to them now is one way to help along the cause of Americanization."

Too Much Levity In The Churches

Parson Says Horseplay Should be Stopped at Weddings

London, Dec. 12—Parsons should permit no rowdiness at the altar during marriage ceremonies is the solemnly worded advice given to his colleagues by the Rev. Peter Green, rector of St. Philip's, Salford, and chaplain to the King, in a book he has just published entitled "The Town Parson."

After years of experience it is his opinion that bad behavior at weddings is common, and the writer says he has seen many weddings marked by deplorable conditions of levity and profanity. He says—

"The bridegroom is often nervous and attempt to pass it off with horse-play, or a middle-aged woman in the company with a local reputation as to wit thinks it incumbent on her to play the fool, or the whole party has been drinking and one or two have taken a good deal too much."

While not advocating "dry" weddings, Rector Green says that no clergyman has a right to marry a man or woman not sober enough to know what is happening. Reverence, he declares, should be insisted on.

WOMAN IN HAMILTON IS BURNED TO DEATH

Hamilton, Dec. 12—Mrs. Mary Golden, 285 East Ferry street, passed away at the General Hospital here as a result of burns she sustained when her clothing caught fire at her home. Her husband, Nathan Golden, left her standing in the kitchen while he went out to feed the horse. When he reached the stable he heard his wife scream. Rushing back to the house he found the kitchen which she was wearing was a mass of fire and that the woman's body could scarcely be seen for the enveloping flames. Mr. Golden extinguished the fire as quickly as he was able, but his wife had been burned from head to foot and was unconscious. The police ambulance was summoned and removed her to the City Hospital, where she became delirious. Parts of her body were burned black. It is thought that her clothing took fire from a small heater in the kitchen. She was thirty-six years of age.
