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DOMINION DAY.

Domination Day, 1919, will find the Canadian people in a mood of rejoicing. The country is at peace, and the future, despite the burdens imposed by the war, is full of promise. The greater number of the soldiers are home again, the peace treaty has been signed, and the world, if not yet free to resume its accustomed activities, is at least out from under the shadow of the great conflict that was waged at such colossal cost in blood and treasure. The Canadian people did their part nobly in the struggle to make the world safe for democracy. They have now the task of making Canada safe for democracy, and may be relied on to perform it well. There are problems political, industrial and social, but the genius of our people will solve them and keep the Dominion headed in the direction of peace, progress and prosperity. To be a Canadian is to be a citizen of a great country, worthy of the most sincere devotion and service. If we serve Canada as our sons served the cause of civilization on foreign fields, there can be no doubt whatever of the result. We are still building a nation, and the structure must be worthy of the sacrifices made during the last five years of momentous struggle. Even as we kept our heads and never doubted, struggling on through the war to a successful outcome, so we must face our industrial and social problems of today and tomorrow, resolved that this country shall be made one in which justice reigns and the rights of every individual are given full recognition. It has not been entirely so in the past; it must be made so in the years to come.

THE VOCATIONAL GRANT

There is some prospect that the federal bill relating to technical education will be amended so that the provinces will get a lump sum in addition to the proportion per capita. This change has been strongly urged by the maritime provinces, and their views were strongly presented by Mr. Copp of Westmorland, Mr. McIsaac of Prince Edward Island, and several Nova Scotia members, including the leader of the opposition, Mr. Copp said: "I would draw the minister's attention to sub-section 3 of this section, providing for the apportionment of the money between the several provinces in proportion to population. When this matter was under consideration before, it was pointed out very distinctly that the minister was following along the lines of the agricultural instruction act. That act provides for a minimum allowance to each province before the grant is apportioned on the per capita basis. I am in receipt of a communication from the Board of Technical Education in New Brunswick pointing out that it is very important that an allowance should be provided for the smaller provinces as a foundation on which to work. Otherwise the basis of apportionment would be very unfair to the provinces with a small population. On the per capita basis Prince Edward Island, for instance, would receive only \$8,000 out of this grant and New Brunswick only \$80,000, which is a very small amount with which to accomplish much in the line of technical education, either by establishing a technical school or combining technical education with the ordinary school work. In technical schools such as we hope to see established under this grant there is always a certain amount of overhead expenses for instructors, preparatory work and so forth, and I submit that it would be unfair to the provinces with a small population not to provide a minimum allowance before distributing the grant according to population. On behalf, therefore, of my own province, and I know I shall have the sympathy of every hon. member from the maritime provinces who takes an interest in technical education, I would urge the minister to see if he cannot provide for a minimum amount being allotted to each province as was done under the agricultural instruction act. The minimum there, I think, was \$20,000. The smaller provinces have been struggling along valiantly in extending their educational facilities, and it is a very heavy burden, particularly in regard to technical education." Mr. D. D. McKenna pointed out that in the case of the proposed federal aid for highways it is provided that there is to be a minimum of \$80,000 for each province, the balance to be distributed in proportion to population. He saw no reason why the same principle should not apply in regard to technical education. Hon. Mr. Calder said he was inclined to the view that the bill should be amended in the direction suggested, and the section was stood over for further consideration.

Some of the German newspapers dressed in mourning their issues announcing the signing of the peace treaty. They sorrow because of the terms imposed; not for the atrocities committed or for the fearful world disturbance caused by the arrogant Hun desire for domination.

Formal peace celebration and peace holiday in Canada must await proclamation at Ottawa.

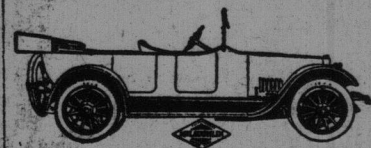

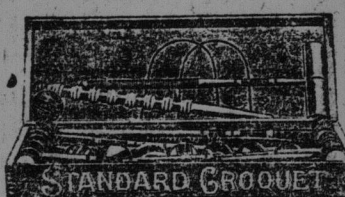

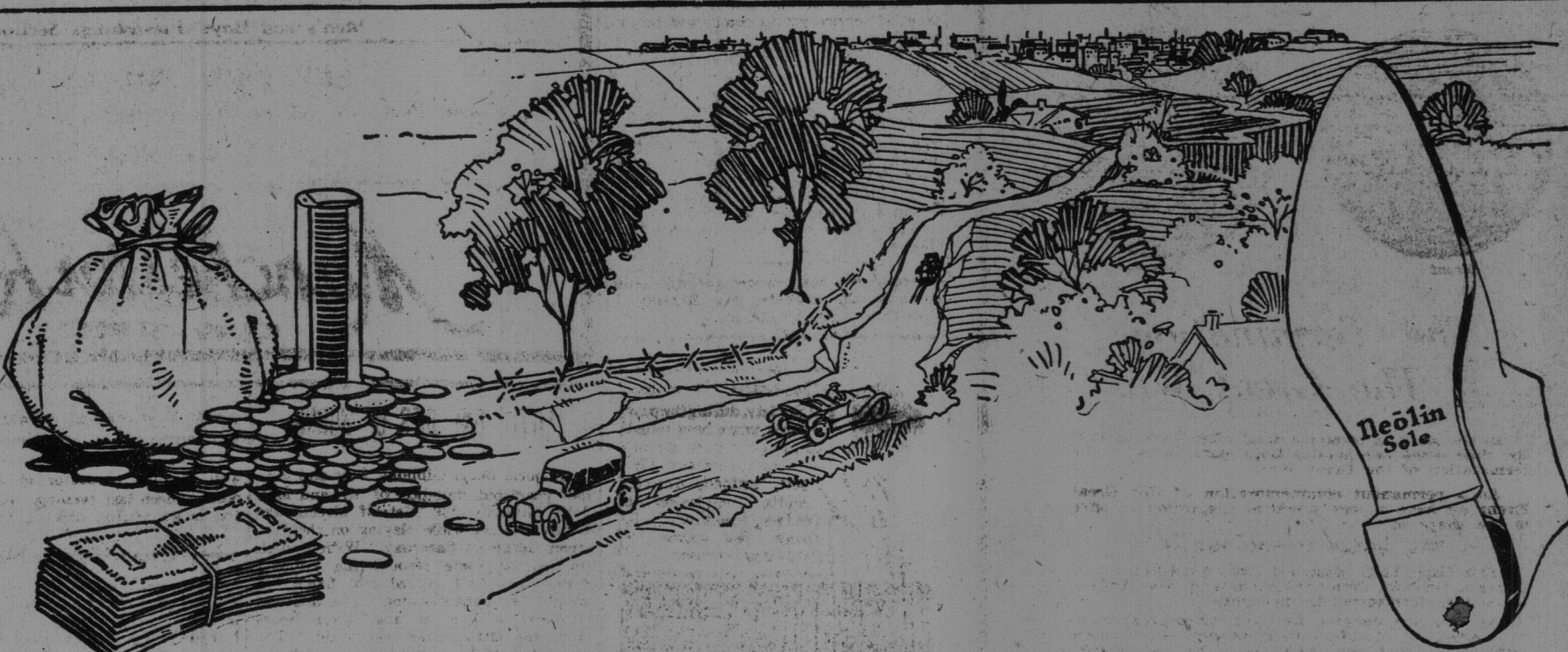
