### USE THE SCHOOL BUILDINGS AS SOCIAL CENTRES

Some Information For St. John People Concerning This Great Movement and Its Results

#### VII

Rev. Walter T. Sumner, Dean of the Cathedral of St. Peter and Paul, and chairman of the Chicago Vice Commission, in an address delivered over two years ago, spoke with great force and eloquence concerning the value of the social center, in relation to the improvement of both economic and social conditions, the protection of children, the struggle against the social evil, and the solution of problems which confront the moral and social reformer. Chicago has \$48,000,000 worth of property used only for four or five hours a week, and the city made the mistake of providing other buildings for social center work before it began to make use of these. The concluding portion of Rev. Mr. Sumner's address was worth quoting in full, remembering, however, that it relates to conditions over two years ago, and that a good deal of progress in the social center movement has been made since then.

"In Chicago we have \$10,000,000 appropriated for own centres. They are in the worst parts of Chicago, and they each average an attendance of three hundred a night. They come there to study, to read, to dance, to see the moving pictures, and to hold dramatic performances, to have orchestras, and to have gymnastics, and if there is any question in the minds of any of us whether these pay or not, let us come to visit them some night when we are in Chicago and see the enthusiasm. We went to Rochester and got the ideas from the man who has meant so much for this movement, Mr. E. J. Ward. Then we went to New York and got additional information, and so we believe that our social centres have that is best in these different cities in Rochester, New York, Boston, and some of the other eastern cities. It is not necessary, I am sure, with this audience to plead for the social centre in the public schools. We are all converted to that idea. But I do plead that in these social centres there may be aroused some interest in civic and national questions; that we may get away from party politics and the politician; that we may bring a high state of efficiency in the administration of our public affairs. The young people there may be kept through constructive work and effort, from those vicious conditions which surround the slums, the streets, and in the dance hall, which in Chicago are so bad I can hardly tell in public all the things that take place there. There are constructive agencies in these school social centres which will give to all of its young and old that which belongs to every man, woman and child, and which no other place has. There are centres in this country where there may be a forum for public speech, where the nine million women of this country may have their meetings and protest against the injustice done them; where the men will speak in the interests of the 2,000,000 on the street facing the altar of Saint Agnes. My tomb is to be covered with a simple marble tablet, and I have engraved the following words: 'Expecto domum vestram mutatio mea.' I forbid my heirs to put any other inscription on my tomb, 'I hereby appoint my nearest heirs in equal shares my dearest brothers, Vincenzo and Francesco, and my most beloved sister Eleonora. The light of the sun, which is the light of the world, assigned to me for my holy mission, and of my paternal inheritance, shall, as well as my ecclesiastical rank, be most affectionately Mother (Giulia) during her natural life."

"I most humbly beg the holiness of our Lord, the Supreme Pontiff, Leo XIII, to deign accept as pledge of deep respect, sincere gratitude and affectionate attachment the right of the Republic of Colombia on the occasion of the concordat of December 1, 1887, which date recalls the happy day of its sacerdotal jubilee."

"To my titular Church of Santa Cecilia I bequeath all the other episcopal vestments, of velvet curtains, three pectoral crosses, with their respective chains, one of which is adorned with pearls, one with brilliants; three episcopal rings, two with emeralds and brilliants and one with pearls and brilliants, as well as the decorations received from various courts, including the one adorned with brilliants which was given to me by the Queen Regent of Spain."

"The price from the sale of the above objects, with the exception of \$500 as shall be retained for the use of Santa Cecilia, shall be entirely devoted to embellishing the church and ornamenting the altar of the titular saint. For the same object, my heirs will contribute the sum of \$1,000 which they will pay when requested to the cardinal who succeeds me in this titular church."

"To the most reverend Chapter of St. Peter I bequeath my three white, red and purple chasubles (to the most reverend Chapter of St. Mary Major the precious chalice used by the Supreme Pontiff Leo XIII on the celebration of his jubilee mass on January 1, 1888, and a chasuble with long lace used by myself on solemn occasions; to my dear brother-in-law Federico I bequeath as an affectionate keepsake a painting of wood representing the Holy Family by Andrea del Sarto. To my nephew Francesco I bequeath a silver toilet service."

Cross Given by German Emperor

"To Mr. Luigi Galimberti, as a token of sincere benevolence, I bequeath the jewelled pectoral cross with gold chain given to me by His Majesty the Emperor of Germany. To Mr. Mallo Mocenni I bequeath a miniature representing the Virgin with the book of Raphael; to Mr. Giacomo Della Chiesa the gold medals of the present Pope given to me during the time I was secretary of state; to my secretary a richly bound missal with a silver cup; to all my servants a year's salary to each, but to my faithful valet, Giuseppe Caretti, the sum of 8,000 lire (\$800)."

"Written by my hand in Rome today, April 19, 1889."

"Mariano, Cardinal Rampolla."

This will was made before Cardinal Rampolla became Archbishop of St. Peter. His two brothers as well as his mother died a few years later. Since 1889 Cardinal Rampolla spent over \$80,000 in restoring his titular church of Santa Cecilia, and surprise has been expressed

### THE CARDINAL'S WILL

Bequests Made By Prince of The Church

#### LATER DOCUMENT MISSING

Text of Instrument Drawn up by Cardinal Rampolla Some Years Ago—Bequest to Pope Leo Included

(From New York Sun's Rome Correspondent.)

Cardinal Rampolla was an extremely orderly man. All his letters were carefully filed, and all his documents were marked and numbered and in a small drawer of his desk he kept several keys, each with a cardboard tag attached on which was written a few words. One of the keys, a small one, bore the following inscription: "Key of the ebony box with my will in the cupboard with mirrors." A search was made for the ebony box both in the cupboard with mirrors and in other furniture, but all efforts to find it proved fruitless. A will of Cardinal Rampolla was, however, discovered. It is dated 1889 and written on four sheets of paper by the Cardinal himself. The complete text follows:

Text of the Will

"In the name of the most Holy Trinity, Father, Son and Holy Ghost, Amen. "Considering how precarious and fleeting is human life and how troubled the prevailing times, with my thoughts on death which might overtake me suddenly, if God so wills it, being of sound mind and eager to avail myself of the right granted to me both by canon and civil laws, by means of this will written by myself I dispose what follows:

"First, all in departing from this world, filled with the most humble and deep gratitude toward the Divine bounty for the many favors received, with full and unlimited faith place my soul in the hands of God, my most beloved creator and redeemer, through whose immediate mercy and through infinite merits of His most precious blood shed for me, and by the powerful aid of His blessed Mother, virgin and infusant, as well as of the Saints and special protectors, despite the multitude of my sins, I hope that a place of salvation will be given me."

"When my body becomes a corpse I desire that it be in no way embalmed or handled by anybody, but that it be exposed according to custom, simply dressed in the vestments prescribed by ceremonial. As to the funeral I beg my heirs to follow the instructions of the Prefect of the Congregation of the Holy Office, which regulates the funerals of cardinals. Immediately after my death I desire that my heirs have 200 masses celebrated for the repose of my soul."

"I direct that my body be provisionally interred in the most simple and modest manner at the Cemetery of Campo Verano in the chapel of the Holy Congregation of Propaganda, to which I belong. When the period prescribed by law has elapsed I direct my heirs to have my body exhumed and my remains transferred in the most private manner to my titular church or Santa Cecilia. This will be my last resting place."

Only One Inscription on Tomb

"I desire that my remains be buried in the crypt of the above-mentioned titular church and placed near the tomb of the glorious virgin and martyr Cecilia, next to the sepulchre of the Cardinal Paolo Strozzi, on the side facing the altar of Saint Agnes. My tomb is to be covered with a simple marble tablet, and I have engraved the following words: 'Expecto domum vestram mutatio mea.' I forbid my heirs to put any other inscription on my tomb."

### BURNS NIGHT OBSERVED BY CLAN MACKENZIE

Chief E. B. McDonald was in the chair, and Rev. J. H. A. Anderson delivered the speech of the evening, on the Immortal Memory of Robert Burns, which was greatly enjoyed. Mayor Frink responded to the toast to the city, proposed by H. L. McGowan. The order of proceedings after the dinner included many songs of Scottish origin and universal fame—Annie Laurie, by Thomas Guy; Ye Banks and Braes o' Bonnie Doon, by Miss B. Wray, and others by Frank Wray and S. J. McGowan. Other speakers were Chief E. B. McDonald who gave the toast of the King, of private individuals."

G. G. Corbett, M. D., proposing the toast of The Ladies' Auxiliary; Mrs. R. Jamieson, lady chief, who replied; R. A. C. Brown, Andrew Malcolm, royal deputy, and William Cameron. The toast not already mentioned were St. Andrew's Society and the O. S. G.

The festive evening was concluded with the Highland fling. A dainty menu card, with a picture of Robert Burns and decorated with the thistle, had been prepared.

#### The Thaw Case
