## THE LOCAL STORM

### Intercolonial

Bad Tie-up of Trains on the Intercolonial

Contrary to the recent order of events, as far as the local weather is concerned, there was a variation of only six degrees in the temperature during the twenty-four hours between nine o'clock yesterday morning and the same hour this morning, which is quite a feat for our mercury. It is very seldom that it will stay so long in the one vicinity—in fact it is generally the most energetic thing in our most energetic city.

The highest registered yesterday was thirteen above and the lowest seven above. The atmosphere was pleasant, however on account of the fact that there was but very little wind, not more than six or eight miles an hour. During the evening the wind freshened a bit and increased throughout the night until between nine and twelve o'clock this morning it had reached a velocity of forty miles an hour.

Snow started falling about six o'clock last night and the high wind drifted it greatly although but three inches fell. The probabilities say fair and cold for tomorrow.

Bulletins from Halifax, Cape Sable and Brier Island this morning all report heavy and blinding snowstorms.

**The Trains**

The storm today caused a tie up of traffic on the railway lines both the I. C. R. and C. P. R. trains being generally off schedule because of the heavy drifts. The early train from Halifax, due here about 8:15 did not reach the city until after one o'clock having been snowed near Memramook besides encountering heavy drifts along the run. It was nearly 11 o'clock before the train left Moncton for St. John. The Maritime was reported running more than 24 hours late. The Boston express was about three hours behind time while the Montreal was more than two hours. The baggage, mail and express of yesterday's Montreal train did not reach the city until about three o'clock this morning although the other portion of the train reached here late yesterday afternoon.

Moncton, N. B., Feb. 17.—One of the worst snow storms and wind storms of the season started about midnight and continued until about three o'clock this morning. Little abatement. All trains on the I. C. R. are delayed. The Halifax and St. John, N. B., is about eight hours late. The Montreal and St. John, N. B., is about four hours behind time. Freight and all mixed trains are cancelled.
