A Tremendous Hit
Several papers have been debating as to the longest hit ever made in any game. Jokes about hits that traveled 400 miles, the ball falling on a car bound from Boston to California, and of course, in order, but there have been some notable wall-punches judged by the feet they covered before they lit.

Absolutely the longest hit of any kind that many ever saw was made in Chicago, in 1888. The batter was Irvin McDowell, a high school player, who could have been a big leaguer if he hadn't been rich and had to attend to business, and the pitcher was Willie McCall, afterwards famous in fast company.

Three throws were needed to take it back into the diamond, and the distance as paced off by several spectators was approximately 690 feet.

Bangor Races.
Bangor, Me., Aug. 7.—(Special)—Baring, a bay stallion from the Cox stables at Dover (N. H.), won the 217 trot for a purse of \$2,000 over the Maplewood track here today. His best mark was 2:12. It was reported at the track that Baring is the stallion by Bangarra that was recently sold by a prominent Canadian horseman for \$5,000.

Baring took the first heat and then finished second for the next two, being beaten by the wire by H. O. McKenney, a chestnut gelding owned by Rathbun of Syracuse (N. Y.). 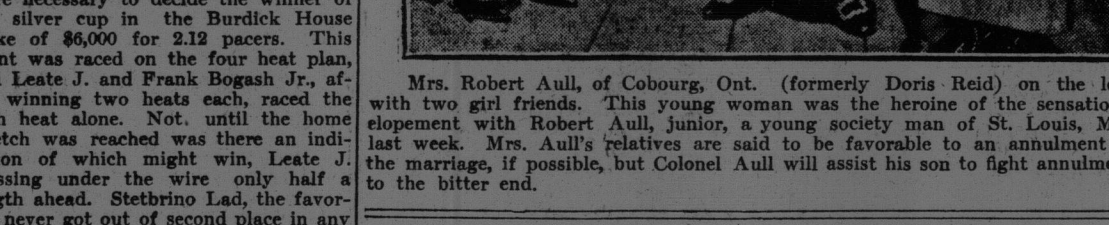

CONFESSED THEFT AND ENDED HIS LIFE
London, Aug. 7.—While the Barry steamer Rugeley was coming up the English Channel from Hamburg a sum of money belonging to one of the crew was found to be missing, and soon afterwards it was discovered in a piece of cloth sewn to the shirt worn by a Norwegian seaman named Vogelsang, aged 22. He was accused and he replied, "I am."

Then picking up a six-chambered revolver he shot himself.
A search made of the man's belongings revealed a complete outfit of up-to-date burglar's and housebreaking implements, as well as some incriminating letters. Vogelsang, who shipped at Hamburg for the voyage, is believed to be one of an expert gang of continental thieves, and the police have taken charge of the tools and letters.

Other teams are scouring the country for players and strengthening all their weak spots.

Should St. John lose the two games to St. Croix, their average at the end of the week would be .368 and St. Croix very much to the cost of salaries of the Marathons.

Next week the Marathons will play in Bangor on Monday and Tuesday. The Marathons certainly should win the pennant, for they have the highest salaried team in the league; also Mr. Leonard is the only manager that does not play in his team, and as his services were secured in February last it adds very much to the cost of salaries of the Marathons.
