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Strong Drama of the Right Woman's Love

The fruits dealt with are the strawberry, raspberry, blackberry, gooseberry, and the several classes of currants. Besides giving full instructions for planting and cultivation, notes are given on the relative merits of varieties.

This pamphlet contains an interesting table on the cost of growing and the returns from an acre of strawberries. At a selling value of five cents a box, a net profit of \$84 is shown. A section is devoted to the preparation and application of insecticides and fungicides that are useful in fruit growing.

Having the information of this paper to guide him, there is no good reason why every farmer should not have a productive fruit garden. A large edition has been printed to be sent free to all who apply to the Publications Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

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
