GOOD BED A GOOD INVESTMENT.

A GOOD bed is a good investment. It should not be too soft. It should have springs that give, permitting the mattress to conform to the shape of the body. Some advise against feather pillows and feather beds. They maintain that feathers overheat the body and head. Hair or cotton mattresses, and cotton or hair pillows are recommended by these.

However, if one is enjoying refreshing sleep on a feather pillow, it would be foolish to throw it away and get a hair pillow. Bed covers should be porous and light. Loosely woven woolen blankets are the best. Two blankets, or two thicknesses of any kind of cover is better than the same thickness and weight in one single piece. Always have the room well ventilated. Night air is not dangerous. The healthiest people are the ones who sleep right out in the open, winter and summer.

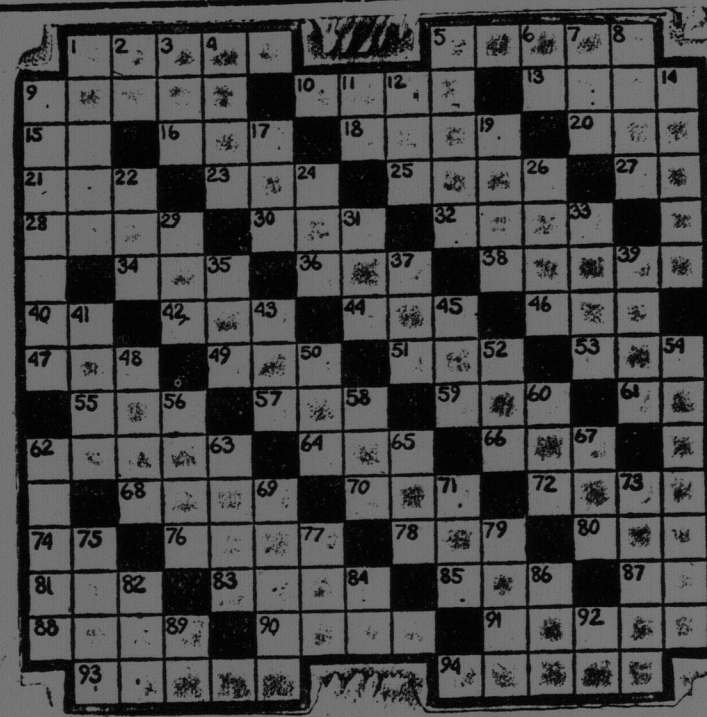

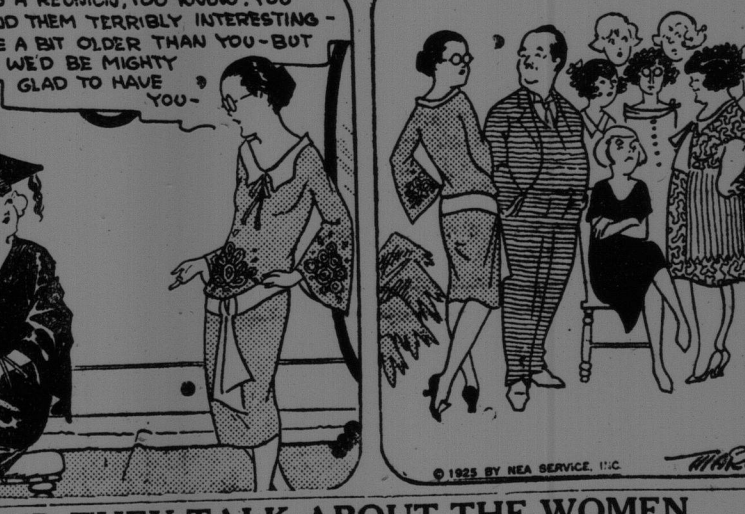
