THE POLICE MAGISTRATE.

It is known that the people of this city have no profound stirrings of indignation, but there is a general feeling of uneasiness, and a desire to see the Police Magistrate to find a political matter that has evoked an equal amount of feeling we have to go back to the year 1874 when the School law fight was going on, when under the magnificent leadership of Attorney General King, the enemies of free non-sectarian schools were routed, and the cause of the people was triumphant.

NOTE AND COMMENT. No one seems to know whether Dr. Alward and Dr. Stockton, whose advice in a St. John appointment has been wholly ignored, will resign or not. If they do, they should receive the support of all the friends of good government in St. John, independently of former political affiliations.

It is to be hoped there will be a large attendance at this evening of those who desire to become members of the Royal Canadian Legion. The formation of such a society in St. John has long been a desideratum, and now that it is being accomplished, it should receive the cordial support of all sons of the Empire.

DR. WILLIAM PUGLEY IS TO BE Solicitor General in the room of Mr. Ritchie. We regret to see a man of Mr. Pugley's ability allied with a discredited government, which is sure to be overwhelmingly defeated when a general election takes place.

THE PROPOSITION of a Southern politician to discontinue the negro is one which may not command much support at present, but it is certain to be rejected by a large party in the South, and to meet with much favor in the future.

THE DISGRACE which is visited by the man without a country who introduced a resolution at the Legislative Assembly, in an editorial on Saturday evening, the gentlemen who form this society, however, are not troubling themselves about Mr. Ellis and his opinions. He is an extinct political force in this community.

HAMILTON appears in the blue book of criminal statistics as the wickedest city in Canada, its summary conviction numbering 2,377 for last year, which is 15 to every 1,000 of population. Halifax is the most moral of the larger cities with only 683 convictions or 17 to the 1,000, but this is probably because the Halifax police are too lazy to make arrests.

MR. MICHAEL McLAIDE'S OPINION. Mr. Michael McLaid is the Fredericton correspondent of the Telegraph, and he is also the official reporter of the House of Assembly. He also appears to be in the confidence of the government, so that from this exalted and dignified position, he is able to look down with something of pity on the benighted inhabitants of St. John, and this morning in the Telegraph he lectures them after the following fashion:—

Although the appointment of Mr. Ritchie is one which the people here do not feel that they could properly influence, or interfere with, yet instances of the government are charged with the duty of making it their very great general satisfaction that Mr. Ritchie has been chosen for the position. The many who have been spending so much of his time in Fredericton have made him intimate to know to all classes in the community, with whom he has become a very general favorite. There is an impression that his appointment has been antagonized in St. John by some very worthy citizens who have been unable to shake themselves, either religiously or otherwise, and it is felt that the action of the government in so detestably resisting pressure of that kind, must have a very beneficial effect in convincing the people of the whole province, of all ranks and classes, that the government does not weigh against any man, admittedly otherwise qualified for office at the disposal of the government.

It is stated that the election of St. John will not likely be brought before the fall. The latter statement is not much to be relied upon, but it is very probable that the absence of the Legislative Assembly for a few months, and the natural indisposition of the government to distract attention from the war incident to the union, and the celebration that are to take place in that connection, might be cause of delay.
