

promoted Tilton to be deputy minister of Fisheries.

Mr. McMillan, in reply, maintained that the papers would show that nothing wrong had occurred; that Tilton had merely acted for Bolton in the matter of the promotion of Tilton occurred after, and not before, the latter occurred.

After six o'clock debate was resumed by Mr. McMillan respecting his former statements.

Mr. Blake called attention to an order in council, enforced for 14 years, which prohibited any member of the civil service acting as attorney for another or paying money to the order of himself.

Mr. Mitchell made an attack upon the opposition for acting in the matter and defended Mr. Tilton, whom he had appointed to office and used as his private secretary when he (Mitchell) was Minister of Marine.

Mr. Blake moved for papers on the question of extradition.

Mr. Rick moved for the engineer's report on the cost of erecting breakwaters at New Harbor and Indian Harbor, and also on White Haven boat canal.

Mr. Patterson (Brent) moved for a statement of imports of wheat and flour into Nova Scotia, including Cape Breton, chargeable to capital account, since confederation.

A large number of returns of sectional interest were moved for, with more or less discussion. Those of the Maritime Provinces, of general interest, were: By Mr. Harris, for copies of all petitions relating to the payment of wages due laborers employed on the construction of Cape Traverse branch of the P. E. I. Railway.

On Thursday 19th Mr. Chatham introduced a bill for the more equitable division of territory to animals; Mr. Cameron (Huron) bill respecting representation of the territories in the House of Commons; Mr. Giguere's bill to amend the law respecting bills of exchange and promissory notes.

Mr. Tiley, replying to Sir Richard Cartwright, and the budget speech would be delivered to-morrow week.

The bill by Mr. Robertson (Hamilton) to declare a misdemeanor to leave unguarded and exposed to the public any navigable or frequented water way, at the instance largely of the maritime province members who thought it would affect the interests of fishermen in its present form, referred to a special committee.

Mr. Landry (Montserrat) moved the second reading of the bill to limit appellate jurisdiction of the Supreme Court of Canada by prohibiting appeals to it from Quebec Province.

Mr. Wood (for Mr. Foster) introduced a bill to amend the Dominion License Act by repealing section 145.

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House divided on the amendment which was rejected by eighty-seven yeas to forty-five nays.

The House adjourned at 10 o'clock.

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Mr. Laurier moved the House into committee of the whole to consider the following resolution:—That the route of a line of railway to connect Montreal with the harbors of St. John and Halifax, for which a subsidy of \$750,000 a year for fifteen years was provided by statute of last session, 47 Victoria, chap. 5, should be subject to the approval of parliament.
