which had been placed against it. The upper rooms were so full of smoke that the men could not work there, and had, at last, to cut through from outside. A good deal of water was necessary to draw out the fumes, which, at times, burst out of the interior walls near the chimney, but were finally subdued.

The house was considerably damaged and some furniture, also, which would not be got at. A good deal of the furniture was, however, saved, but some of it was broken in removing. The building was insured in the Sun and the furniture in the Royal.

Between eleven and twelve o'clock yesterday forenoon there was another alarm. It was caused by a chimney-spark, which had ignited the roof of the Mills building, corner of Water and Duke streets, near the upper part of the innyard wall. The firemen were on hand and had water on a hydrant in less than six minutes, while the hook and ladder truck men had their apparatus on the ground and the ladder in position with similar promptness. The fire had no chance whatever.

The efficiency of Chatham's fire hydrants and the promptness of the firemen in doing their work at these fires, are in gratifying contrast with the delays and losses experienced under similar conditions elsewhere. Aid. Maher assented against the chairman's decision and attempted to act as chairman, by saying "It is moved and seconded that—when aid. Murray asked: "Are you chairman now?" (laughter)

Chief Clerk Gaynor being called upon to "put the motion" refused, saying a chairman had already been chosen for the meeting.

Mr. J. L. Stewart told aid. Maher to say that aid. Niel had no business to leave the chair. Aid. Maher said he would not leave the chair.

Chief Clerk Gaynor said if he put a nomination and the Council was equally divided, could he be expected to decide? Aid. Niel said they were in just the same position as when they came into the hall.

There was no chairman. Aid. Murdoch had been nominated and aid. Maher. The latter was an amendment and should be put to a vote.

Chief Clerk Gaynor: Aid. Niel has no right to leave the chair. Aid. Maher said he would not leave the chair.

Chief Clerk Gaynor: You are only a rabble and not an organization. Chief Clerk Gaynor put the name of aid. Murdoch as chairman. Lost.

Mr. J. L. Stewart: You might as well as nominate. The law doesn't give you the right to elect two chairmen on the same night.

Aid. Melrose said the clerk should have the law here and if a penalty was provided in it for a chairman leaving the chair it ought to be imposed on aid. Niel.
