TELEPHONE STRIKE.
The strike which was declared about
a week ago by the linemen of the New
Brunswick Telephone Co., has not been
settled, but no more trouble between
the employees and the officials of the
company is anticipated, as a number
of the linemen have accepted positions
with other companies. The telephone

work done as they had a large crew of
men, mostly Americans, in the coun-
try districts, and these were brought
into the city. The linemen went on
strike at a fortunate time for the com-
pany as work was slack in the coun-
try and a number could be spared to
work on the city lines.

HUMAN FREAKS WILL FORM AN ASSOCIATION

Tattooed Man, Boneless Wonder, Human
Dog and Three Legged Orphan
to Combine.

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—Preliminary
steps have been taken by some of the
best known human prodigies now ex-
hibiting in New York to form what
will be in effect a "Freaks Union."
Letters have been sent to prominent
freaks all over the country soliciting
their co-operation.
Many favorable replies have, it is
said, been received.
An elastic skin man who is on exhibi-
tion at a Fourteenth street museum,
is one of the men interested in the new
organization. The main purpose of the
union, he said yesterday, is to pro-
vide sick benefits and a fund for the
burial of unfortunate members.

SAFETY DEVICE MEN TO HOLD A BANQUET

Last Year There Were 57,000 Accidental
Deaths in United States for Want
of Proper Precautions

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—Several hun-
dred prominent men will attend a ban-
quet tonight in the Waldorf Astoria in
connection with the exposition of safety
devices and industrial hygiene which
is to be held for two weeks in the
American Museum of Natural History.
Speech will be taken at the banquet and
in the exposition which will be opened
tomorrow, to promote a wider use of
devices invented for the protection of
working men.

This movement had its inception sev-
eral weeks when the census show-
ed more than 57,000 persons were killed
in the United States last year, or nearly
twice the number who met similar
deaths in Europe, where the use of
safety devices has been fostered by
numerous societies.

WENT HOME TO FIND HIS WIFE BURNED TO DEATH

A Pittsburg Mystery—No Sign of Fire in
the Room Where the Body Lay.

PITTSBURG, Jan. 28.—Albert Houck,
found the body of his wife lying on a
table of her room burned to a crisp
when he returned home from work last
night. The first police theory of
accidental death was abandoned when
it was discovered that nothing else in
the room was burned. When the woman
was found, her husband arrived. The
doors were all locked, all the lights in
the house were out and he was com-
pelled to climb through a cellar win-
dow.

SON OF CORSICAN COBBLER POSES AS FRENCH MARQUIS

Lived in Luxury on the Proceeds of Frauds Upon Credulous
Women, of Whom He Had Twenty Victims.

PARIS, Jan. 28.—A cobbler's son
named Dieudonne Erocle, who mas-
queraded as the Marquis de St. Aubin
and St. Andre Comte de Courvelles,
was sentenced today to five years im-
prisonment after an astonishing career
of fraud.
Erocle is an accomplished Don Juan,
and by his great personal attractions
he succeeded in turning the heads of
a number of women and defrauding
them of \$10,000. He lived in very
elegant style in a house near the Ecole
Militaire, keeping a motor car, horses,
carriages and a number of servants.
His coat-of-arms was inscribed with
the motto: "War, virtue and worth."
OF DISTINGUISHED APPEARANCE
He was tall, of athletic build, and of
very distinguished appearance. He
was supposed to be a bachelor, and
fashionable women schemed and in-
trigued to be invited to the delightful
soirees he gave. Now, without warn-
ing, to the astonishment of Paris
society, the handsome marquis has
disappeared. One morning a few
weeks ago he received a polite note
requesting his presence in the office of
M. Drapier, a judge d'instruction. The
magistrate said that a Belgian, Mile.
Armeline Van Gelder, a beauty spe-
cialist, aged 19, of Brussels, had filed a
complaint charging the marquis with
swindling her out of \$400 and various
articles of jewelry.
He then went to Belgium, where he
met a Mme. Durcamp, with a fortune
of \$30,000. He proposed marriage, and
was accepted, but just before the cere-
mony he told her his real name, adding
that he was the natural son of the
Duc de Penthièvre. Mme. Durcamp,
who was anxious to become a duchess,
did not mind, and the wedding took
place. A year later he left her with a
baby and without any money.
The "marquis" next made the ac-
quaintance of a Mile. Hermantine Vas
Gelder, an actress, and managed to
borrow considerable sums of money
from her. He also borrowed her jew-
els without her permission.
The number of women he has vic-
timized must be at least a score.

PITTSBURG, Jan. 28.—The Rev. Dr.

CHICAGO, Ill., Jan. 28.—Edward Mc-
Kinstry Teal, for years president of
the Chicago Underwriters' Association,
died last night after a month's illness
of grippe and resulting complications.
Mr. Teal was born at Albany, N. Y.
on July 22, 1839. At the time of his
death Mr. Teal was president of the
board of trustees of the McCormick
Theological Seminary and president of
the Chicago Relief and Aid Society.

ANOTHER EXPEDITION TO CAPTURE RAISULI

TANGIER, Jan. 28.—Operations for
the pursuit of Raisuli will be begun
again today with a bombardment
of Zella's fortress, in which Raisuli is
surrounded. Large quantities of art-
illery ammunition have been forwarded
to the front and a number of the
friendly tribes will participate in the
attack.

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—Kerosene

burned her three-year-old son Joseph

FOUR LIVES WERE LOST IN DOVER MILL FIRE

All the Victims Were Boys—Flames
Started up Again on Sunday and
Burned all Day.

DOVER, N. H., Jan. 27.—That only
four lives were lost in the fire which
destroyed No. 1 mill of the Coburn
Mfg. Co.'s plant here yesterday, was
established today when it was learned
that all of the employees of the mill ex-
cept four had been accounted for.
Four charred bodies were taken from
the ruins yesterday and it is believed
that these were the bodies of the four
missing employees, all of whom were
boys.

The fire broke out afresh last night,
burned throughout today and it was
thought that the flames could not be
extinguished until there was no more
fuel for them to feed upon. From mid-
night until 7 o'clock this morning the
firemen worked in a temperature vary-
ing from 5 to 14 degrees below zero,
and cases of frostbite and frozen ex-
tremities were numerous.
Medical Examiner John H. Neal, of
Rochester, came here this morning and
viewed the bodies of the victims. One
of the bodies was identified as that of
John Cooksore, a boy of 15, who was
employed as a filling carrier in the
weave room of the mill. He came to
this country from Ireland only two
months ago and lived with his uncle
John Redding on Fourth street. It was
impossible to identify the other bodies,
but they are believed to be those of the
three missing boys, Alfred Barron, Con-
stantine Giocopoulos, and John Nicol-
opolous.

The injured who were taken to the
Wentworth Hospital were reported to-
night as out of danger and on the road
to recovery.
The fire today burned down through
the third, second and first floors into
the basement and it was thought that
the walls of the mill were likely to
collapse at any time.

EMPEROR WILLIAM'S BIRTHDAY CELEBRATED

BERLIN, Jan. 27.—Emperor William's
birthday was celebrated today by the
populace throughout the country. The
Emperor and members of the Imperial
family appeared on the streets today
and were cheered enthusiastically. The
city was brilliantly illuminated to-
night. The Emperor today issued an
ordinance that henceforth penalties
for less markets will only be inflicted
upon those persons who commit the of-
fense with premeditation and evil in-
tention, and not upon those who do it
through ignorance or thoughtlessness.
