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BELIEVES HE HAS GROUNDS FOR ACTION AGAINST THE CITY

Mr. Cushing Refused, However, to
Say What He Would Do.

Has Made No Plans for the Future Yet
—Explains the Wharf Extension
Matter.

R. H. Cushing when seen last night by The Sun, was not willing to give any statement in regard to his position since his retirement by the Common Council yesterday afternoon. He remarked, however, that he supposed the council had taken their action believing it for the best and his wish for them was that they would get a better man.

Asked whether he thought he had any ground of action against the city, he replied that he undoubtedly had, and that this was apparent without any opinion by the recorder. He would not, however, say whether or not he would take action against the city.

Asked as to his plans for the future, Mr. Cushing said that he had made none. In regard to the remarks of Ald. Baxter about the director strongly urging upon the board that the additional work should be given to D. G. Clarke without tender, Mr. Cushing said that the newspaper files would show that he made it as a suggestion.

stipulating, however, that Mr. Clarke should be given the contract only if his figures were quite satisfactory to the board.

The newspaper report of January 10th says that the suggestion was made by Ald. Willet who said that two or three weeks would be saved. Director Cushing agreed, saying that it would be a usual course under the circumstances.

THE UNWRITTEN LAW SAVED NEGRO'S LIFE

COLUMBIA, June 6. — John Jacobs, a negro, was acquitted in the circuit court of Richland County today of murdering his wife, Bessie Jacobs, and her paramour, John Johnson, on the night of May 5. Jacobs went home on that night and finding the two in a compromising position, killed both by beating their heads with a hammer. He interposed the plea of temporary insanity, but the jury was appealed to go on the plea of the unwritten law, and this is what they based their verdict upon, the jury remaining out but fifteen minutes.

MONTREAL, June 7. — The graduating class in medicine at McGill was announced tonight. There are twenty-one Maritime Province men among the seventy-four who will receive their degrees at the approaching convocation. For the fifth year in succession a Maritime Province man carried off the highest honors. He is R. M. Benzie, Salt Springs, N. S., and he was not only the Holmes gold medal awarded for highest standing in all four years of the course but also the Wood gold

medal for best clinical work.

No. VIII Field Ambulance will be inspected on Monday night at eight o'clock. The inspection will take place in the armory on Union street. The inspecting officer will be Lt. Col. G. H. Ogilvie, R. C. H. A., D. S. A. All members of the unit are requested to turn out Monday night.

The Field Ambulance has still room for some more good recruits. For some time enlistment went on rapidly, but for the last week or so but few men have been enrolled. However the officers and N. C. O.'s of the corps seem confident that the ambulance will go to Camp Sussex at full strength. Company drills are being held two nights a week in preparation for camp. The last drill was on Thursday; about forty men were on parade.

On Sunday last the ambulance men were nearer full strength than any militia corps on parade. The unit was only nine under strength.

From present indications it would seem that the 8th P. L. N. B. Hussars will go into camp in a very weak condition as far as officers are concerned. It is understood that several have applied for leave of absence while others have severed their connection with the regiment. Squadron C, Sackville, judging from indications, will have but two officers, its major and one lieutenant. The lack of officers will likely be made up by attaching R. M. C. cadets.

FIRE SWEEPS ELMVALE, ONT.

Large Number of Cwellings Destroyed
—Bucket Brigade Unable to
Cope With the Flames.

TORONTO, June 7. — The village of Elmvalle, in Simcoe county, was visited this morning by the worst fire in its history, and nearly half the business section was wiped out. Vance's tailor shop took fire, and the flames spread such a start that the bucket brigade of the village could not cope with them. The following places of business were burned: M. J. Lawson's harness, W. G. Vance's tailor shop, H. J. Greenwood's jewelry, S. J. Manning's grocery store with boots and shoes, S. Draper's grocery, W. T. Stewart's general store, R. H. Middleton's insurance office.

A. T. Cooper's store, in which the post office is situated, and the Queen's Hotel were badly scorched and had a lot of glass broken. The Bank of Toronto building was badly damaged. It is impossible to get a full estimate of the losses, but the total will probably be about forty-five thousand dollars, not more than half covered by insurance. Incendiarism is suspected.

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KILTIES ANNOYED BY MAIL TEAM

Letter Drove Through Their Ranks Repeatedly—Col. Buchanan Reported
Katter to the Police

The Scots companies of the Boys' Brigade held a march out last night under command of Col. Buchanan and paraded through the principal streets. The boys turned out fifty strong and made a very fine showing. The many spectators congratulated the boys and the colonel on their fine appearance. Among the interested witnesses of the parade were Col. Ogilvie and Rev. Gordon Dickie, pastor of St. Stephen's Church.

Col. Buchanan and his "kilties" during their march were very much annoyed by two men in charge of the Royal Mail team who, it is claimed, broke into the line, even halting their conveyance right in the line of march and driving round and round the pipers. The annoyance was begun on Co-burg street and continued while the boys marched down King street. The drivers were recognized both by members of the company and by other spectators. Their names are said to be Walsh and Hamilton. The police also took their names and the matter has been reported.
