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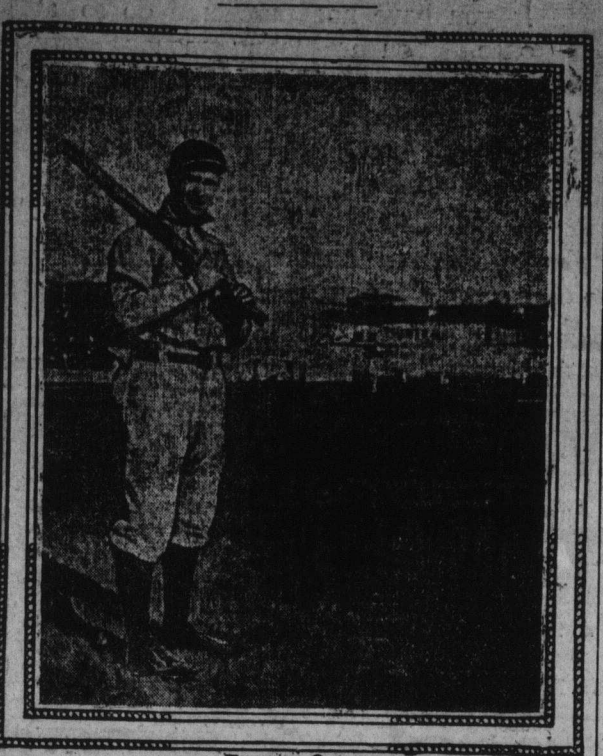

HOLMER WILL BE IN HALIFAX TOMORROW

The contracts for the Wood-Holmer race were forwarded from Halifax on Monday to Abbie Wood and Hans Holmer. They provide that the winner of the 20-mile race, which is to be held at Halifax, June 21st, shall receive 50 per cent of the amount to be divided. Wood and Holmer will reach Halifax on Friday and will train until the evening of the race. Haligonian officials will manage the race. The Quebec race in which Holmer was to compete on June 24th will probably be dropped so far as Holmer is concerned, as he is likely to remain in Halifax for a short time.

Holmer feels confident of beating Wood and of winning from him the championship of Canada. At the Montreal race he claims that he was blocked by the people and prevented from getting in to the finish ahead of Wood.

MUNROE SAYS JEFF WILL BEAT JACK JOHNSON

Jack Munroe, who had nerve enough to go up against Jeffries twice, only to be knocked out in the first round, and who is now Mayor of Elk City, Canada, is in New York. Munroe fought a six-round draw with Jack Johnson in Philadelphia four years ago and therefore thinks he is qualified to talk about the comparative merits of Jeff and the negro. "Jeff is the only man who can beat Johnson," says the former "miner," and he can win by a knockout inside of fifteen rounds. Jeff of course must be himself to do this trick, for the big black is a tough proposition. I think Ketchel is too small to beat him."

BASEBALL GLINTS.

"Dutch" Beville of the Richmond team of the Virginia league has almost as good a pitching record as has Geo. Mullin, having won 11 games and lost but one since the season started.

The Pittsburgh club leads the National league in extra base hits, having made up to Sunday, 57 two-baggers, 28 three-baggers and four home runs. Boston is eighth with 36 doubles, 12 triples and two homers, while Philadelphia brings up the rear with 45 doubles, eight triples and two homers.

Up to last Sunday the Cincinnati team led the National league in double plays with 35. Brooklyn and Boston had 30 each. Pittsburgh 29; New York 28; St. Louis 26; Chicago 24; and Philadelphia 20.

"Stoney" McGlynn of the Milwaukee club leads the American Association pitchers in shut-outs, having pitched five. He has had one two-hit game, two three-hit and two four-hit contests and one five-hit game to his credit.

The St. Louis Cardinals have purchased Pitches Landrum and Cowell and Third Baseman Barkwell from the Decatur (Ill.) club. The price paid for the three men was \$2,500.

Both the Pittsburgh Pirates and the Detroit Tigers are so far in the lead that it looks as if nothing short of an avalanche will stop them from copping the batting.

The Pirates, however, look particularly good and if they keep up their winning streak they stand a chance of making a new world's record for winning the most consecutive games. Detroit, however, must reckon with Cleveland.

Patrick Ragan, Cub recruit pitcher, secured from Cincinnati Monday, was sold to President J. R. Higgins of the Des Moines team of the western league and will leave immediately.

NICKEL—BIRD'S EYE VIEWS OF THE CITY.

MR. BUCHANAN SINGS "MARY OF ARGYLE." "I Wish I Had a Girl." "OLIVER TWIST" and "CARNIVAL AT NICE '09."

THIS MICMAC MAN IS NOVA SCOTIAN

New York, June 16.—Persons who bought Micmac Gold Mining Company stock on the curb a few months ago at about \$4 a share will be interested in the charges and counter charges concerning the promotion of the mine and sale of the stock which are made in the suit of Phil H. Moore against Thomas Reinhardt, a curb broker at 38 Broad street, whose office overlooks the market.

The papers came before the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court on the appeal of Moore from an order of the lower court denying the plaintiff's motion for an inspection of all the Micmac Mining Company's books and papers. The Appellate Court upheld the order, stating that the plaintiff was not entitled to look at Reinhardt's books until he had obtained an interlocutory judgment for an accounting, and then the books will be produced as a matter of course before the referee.

A Nova Scotia Man.

Moore's complaint says that he lives at Bridgewater, Nova Scotia, and that the action is for breach of contract. He asks for \$250,000 damages. He says that early in 1906 he entered into an arrangement to consolidate the Micmac Mining Company and the Nova Scotia into the Micmac Gold Mining Company and that upon paying \$50,000 in \$5,000 monthly instalments he was to have an option on all the stock.

Moore declares that he arranged with Reinhardt to market the stock, the broker to furnish the \$50,000 and the two to divide the profits equally. He declares that Reinhardt put up some money and got the stock, but that he stopped paying on August 23 last, when Moore brought suit. He alleges that Reinhardt didn't do his good faith, but was continually guilty of fraud and was working solely in his own interest.

For the purpose of wiping out Moore's share of the profits the plaintiff says "Reinhardt made bogus or wash sales of hundreds of thousands of shares of stock" to himself and others acting in collusion with him. Reinhardt furnished Moore with an alleged statement of the stock sales and Moore says that this shows that while the broker purchased only 107,255 shares under the option at \$1 a share, he traded in 2,262,632 shares "or in other words the stock under option was sold and resold twenty-one times." Moore says that Reinhardt charged \$54,960 commissions, which he expects to show were for the alleged wash sales.

In Reinhardt's account was the item of \$39,910.40 which Reinhardt said was made up of "charges and expenses of such a nature that it would be unprofitable to itemize and specify the same." An affidavit by Moore's counsel states that this is "clear evidence that the defendant was indulging in practices discountenanced by stock exchanges."

The Portland Daily Argus says:—The first time in years the transatlantic steamers sailing out of Boston did not carry a pound of flour last week. The depression in exports is not confined to grain alone, but is reflected in the shipments of other commodities, with the result that all the ocean steamers leaving Boston are carrying very light cargoes.

The sch. W. E. & W. L. Tuck, Capt. Haley, arrived in port yesterday from New York with coal for R. P. and W. F. Starr.
