Powers of Commission

Powers of Commission

Mr. Carter—"We may as well settle the point whether the commission is going to enquire about the sub-contracts outside of the cost of the road."

He read the section of the act governing that part of the enquiry. He claimed that the jurisdiction of the commission was limited to enquiring whether money had been paid by contractors to Hon. Messrs. Flemming and McLeod. The court was confined to the authority which was conferred on it by the act. While counsel on the other side claimed that public interests demanded the fullest investigation, this did not give any powers.

Judge McKeown—"Who do you say are the contractors?"

Mr. Carter—"The St. John and Quebec Construction Co., and the Hibbard Co. are sub-contractors, and Scott and Kelly are sub-contractors of the sub-contractors under the St. John and Quebec Construction Co.? Inasmuch as Scott and Kelly have no contract from the St. John and Quebee Construction Co.?
