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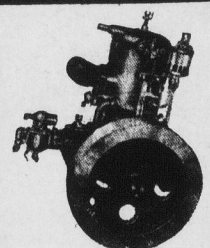

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BIGAMY CHARGE AGAINST WIFE AND HUSBAND

Sidney Hartt said to have tried matrimony three times and his wife twice.

Sidney Albert Hartt was arrested yesterday on the charge of bigamy and his wife, Gertrude Margaret Cook, is also detained, and as she has a husband alive in addition to Hartt, she will likely find herself in serious difficulty. The man and woman are now in the county jail awaiting further proceedings of the court.

Sidney Hartt's first marriage was to Florence Geneva Mayrett. This wife (number one) died. In December, 1907, in Halifax, he married Mary Etta Parker. Hartt managed to exist with one wife alive until December 3rd, 1914, but he is said to have so far forgotten the bonds of matrimony, or else he took a long chance, for on this last date he was married again, in St. John, by Rev. Dr. Hutchinson, and on this occasion the bride was Gertrude Margaret Cook, and the name that this woman gave when being married to Hartt was Gertrude Jackson.

The Parker woman, whom Hartt married in Halifax, was very much alive, and on learning that her husband had illegally married another woman, she laid the information and had him arrested.

In marrying Margaret Cook, who gave her name as Gertrude Jackson, Sidney Hartt did not wed a novice in the matrimonial game, for this woman is also said to be a bigamist, for while Hartt has two wives alive, his wife (number three) has two husbands alive.

It was on September 17th, 1912, that there was a pretty wedding at the home of Margaret Cook's father in St. Mary's, just across the river from Fredericton. Rev. Mr. Jenkins performed the ceremony and Margaret's happy groom was none other than Sterling Hazlewood. Just how long Mr. and Mrs. Hazlewood lived together could not be learned last night, but it could not have been a long period, for in a short time over two years she came to St. John and giving the name of Jackson was married to Hartt.
