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INQUEST RESUMED IN DEATH OF JOHN GOULD, OF MONCTON

L. C. R. Men Tell of Finding Body in Railway Yard, but no one Saw the Accident Happen.

The inquiry into the death of John Gould, who was killed in the L. C. R. yard near the foot of Dorchester street on Wednesday night, Sept. 4th, was resumed before Coroner D. E. Berryman in the court house, last evening. The coroner read a deposition from James Gould, who stated that he had viewed the body of the man killed and identified it as that of his brother, John Gould, of Moncton.

James Coleman, the driver of engine 1007, testified that on the night of the accident he was walking the tracks on an inspection tour and shortly after 11 o'clock he saw a man's hat near the Wall street crossing. He stopped at the cutoff switch and a light engine passed him. He turned round and discovered a man's body lying on the track. Witness saw the man when he was run over. Witness found blood on the rear wheels of the engine.

Arthur Milne, a fireman, gave evidence that he was working on the engine 1007 on the night of the accident. He did not see the man when he was killed. The man might have been on the footboard of the engine before he was run over. Witness found blood on the rear wheels of the engine.

Charles Carlin gave evidence that he knew John Gould and saw him alive at 6 o'clock on the evening he was killed. At that time Gould was in the witness' house on Paradise road. He left the house about 6:30 o'clock saying he was going to the railway station. At that time he was not sober. He appeared able to take care of himself.

The inquest was adjourned until this evening at 7 o'clock.

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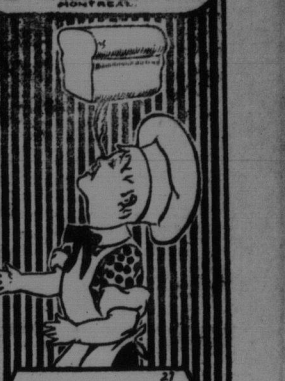
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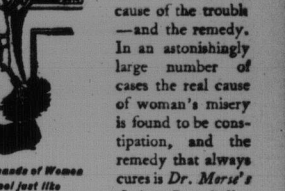
