BRIDGES IN KENT CO. ALSO RECEIVING ATTENTION AS PART OF GOVERNMENT'S NEW POLICY FOR GOOD ROADS

Chatham, Aug. 30.—The S. S. Maryland of the Crew Truck Co., of Philadelphia is in part a cargo of crossed wood. She is 3,600 tons (gross tonnage), and was formerly engaged in the carrying trade of the Great Lakes. To get through the locks into the St. Lawrence the vessel had to be cut in two and towed in sections to Montreal where she was rejoined. On board the steamer besides the regular crew are Mr. Joseph A. Schofield and family, of Warren, Pa., Mr. M. F. Cowden of Tilburyville, Pa., and Mr. C. C. Chapman, superintendent of transportation. The former gentlemen are directors of the Crew Truck Co. As a result of Engineer Feeney's visit to this section some days ago, four gangs of men are engaged in repairing the Richibucto road. The work is being done as a part of the government's scheme to put our provincial roads in better shape. This road is the main highway for traffic and automobile tourists between Chatham and Kent county. Considerable work is also being done in connection with bridges in this vicinity. The local inspector is a busy man these days.

Austrians Yield More Ground Before Fierce Thrusts of Italians

ALPINE TROOPS EXTEND THEIR OCCUPATION OF CREST NORTHEAST OF MT. CAURIAL AND ALSO CARRY STRONG AUSTRIAN POSITIONS AT HEAD OF FELIZON VALLEY AND IN THE REGION OF BOITE.

Rome via London, Aug. 30.—The Italian war office today gave out the following official communication:
"Hostile artillery has fired on our positions continuously between the Adige and Brenta rivers, and also on the shelled Aik, in the Lagarina Valley, Aralero, Volo d'Avico and Seghe, in the Avico Valley.
"In the Passa area our Alpine troops have extended their occupation of the crest northeast of Mont Gaurial and in the Felizon valley. The enemy suffered heavily, leaving 117 prisoners, including three officers, in our hands.
"Along the rest of the front there have been desultory artillery actions. The enemy shelled Gortzia, Valla Sella and Ollero intermittently.
"On the Carso front small actions took place which enabled us to straighten our lines.
"Enemy aeroplanes dropped bombs on Alleghe and on the Lagoan at Marano, wounding a few prisoners, but causing slight damage."

FACTORY MAN LIKELY TO DIE FROM INJURIES

Ebin Miller Falls from Third Story of His Factory and Not Expected to Live.

Fredericton, N. B., Aug. 30.—Ebin Miller, carriage manufacturer in this city, who fell from the third story of his factory shortly before one o'clock at noon today, is still unconscious and will probably die as a result of the accident. He was taken home in an unconscious condition and Dr. G. C. Vanvar, attending physician, expressed the opinion that Mr. Miller would not live. The unfortunate man was engaged in handing a pair of wagon shafts from the top story of the building to a man on the second story, who in turn handed them to James Smith, one of the employees of the factory, who was standing near the rear door of the building. Mr. Miller had handed one pair down and was in the act of giving a second pair to the man on the second story when he was seen to topple through the top door and fall to the ground. He landed on his head at the entrance of the rear door and was unconscious when picked up. While at work on top story of the building about two weeks ago Mr. Miller took a fainting spell and injured his head in a fall. At Frederickton High School today Walker MacAdam was elected captain of the football team for the coming season; Daniel James was elected vice-captain and Walter Howie manager. The team will start practices next week.

NEW PERSIAN CABINET FORMED

All Members Belong to the Moderate Party and Friendly to Russia and Great Britain.
Paris, Aug. 30, via London.—According to dispatches from Teheran a new Persian cabinet has been formed under the premiership of Vossough El Dowlah, who also will take the post of foreign minister. All the other ministers in the cabinet belong to the moderate party, and are reported to be friendly disposed towards Russia and Great Britain.

BRITISH AUXILIARY CRUISER SUNK BY GERMAN "U" BOAT

Berlin Report Says—Likely the Duke of Albany, Reported by British Admiralty as Torpedoed.

Berlin, Aug. 30, by wireless to Sayville.—The sinking of a British auxiliary cruiser in the North Sea on August 24 by a German submarine was announced today by the admiralty. Berlin newspapers say that apparently the vessel referred to was the Duke of Albany, whose loss had been announced by the British government. The British admiralty announced, on Saturday, that the Duke of Albany, an armed merchant steamer of 1,977 tons, used for boarding purposes had been torpedoed and sunk with the loss of 23 of the 110 persons on board.

MANY CASUALTIES FROM EXPLOSION ON U.S. CRUISER

The Memphis Still on Rocks Outside Santo Domingo and Likely to be Total Loss.
Santo Domingo, Aug. 30.—The United States cruiser Memphis is still on the rocks of the outer harbor, and probably will be a total loss. An explosion in the boiler room resulted in a large number of casualties. It is feared the loss of life is heavy. A dispatch was received by wireless from the United States gunboat Castine, which put to sea when the storm broke. The message said the vessel was cruising in front of the harbor.
