

In the treaty they are promised
one school. When Howard, the Govt agent,
got their assent in 1867, he promised
they should have 4 schools - none have
been opened yet - no books supplied -
or any teacher sent near them. There are
now 100 children of school age at the Pass -
50 at the Eddy 4 miles off - 30 at Birch
river 30 miles away - and 50 at Pass
mountain 70 miles off. They have
themselves built a school house at
Eddy but it has not been opened for
want of a teacher - There is a school
here, supported by the Church Missionary
Society of England, at which the Revd.
W. Cochran, is now teaching 53 children.
They are very anxious that the schools
should be opened and their children
taught.

Moose Lake

10 Sept 1879

I had an interview with the
Chief here, representing about 60
families -

Their reserve has been surveyed.

They were promised 7 cattle, like
the others, and got one ox last year,
which alone is of no use, and has not
therefore been taken from the fort.

Their flour was delivered in just
the same condition as at the other places.

They want more ploughs and
horses - especially the latter - They also want
