I once instituted an examination into the fatness of the charges made by this firm. I think it was in 1873. Insolvency Postage.

OTTAWA, March 4.

The Insolvency Committee on clauses 4 and 9, providing for a creditor throwing a debtor into insolvency either by requiring him to make an assignment or by applying to the Court for a writ of attachment on his estate in favor of an official assignee, were amended so as to require from the creditor making the demand an affidavit that he was not in collusion with the debtor to obtain any advantage over the creditors.

The Postmaster General moved the House lato committee to consider the resolutions amending the Postal Act, the principal features of which have been it. dicated, and are in accordance with suggestions thrown out by private members. Letters posted with insufficient prepayment will be forwarded, and the additional cents charged to the receiver; drop letters one literate the pound; prepaid single newspapers one cent per pound; prepaid single newspapers under half ounce one cent, prepaid; three cents, instead of five, to be the rate charged on fitead letters, to defray the cost of returning them.

Mr. Bowell thought the Act was prepared in the interest of the department rather than of the public; it did not favor newspaper enterprise. They should be carried free. He asked why \$40,000 or \$50,000 was asked to provide for free delivery in cities while imposing such a tax on newspaper publishers.

Mr. Tweedie gave notice of a resolution calling for papers connected with the appointment of scalers of lumber in Northumberland, together with the instructions given to them, etc.
