

SUMMARY OF AUSTRIAN TREATY
OTTAWA,—The following is a summary of the text of the Austrian peace terms, received here by the Government and issued to the Canadian Press:

The conditions of peace of the Allied and Associated powers, with the exception of Military reparations, financial and boundary clauses, were handed to the Austrian plenoptentiaries at St. Germain to-day. The clauses, which are not ready for presentation, will be delivered as soon as possible. The Austrians in the meanwhile have the opportunity to begin work on the greater part of the treaty in an effort to facilitate greater decision.

The Austrian treaty follows exactly the same outline as that of Germany, and in places is identical with it, except in name. Certain specific clauses, which applied only to Germany, are of course omitted, and certain new clauses of particular applicability of Austria are included, especially as regards the new states created out of the former Austro-Hungarian empire. Austria is left by treaty a state of six million people inhabiting territory of between fifty thousand and sixty thousand

Two cases of smlalpox have been discovered in the city...

THE ACT EXPLAINED

Not being able to interpert the notices in the press of late as to the
meaning of the present procedure to
take in regard to the securing of
liquor, a prominent citizen of the city
wrote the Department in this regard
and received the following reply
which is clear and precise. It reads
as follows:

Dear Sir:
Your letter is to hand making certain enquiries, to which I may reply that the transference of the licensed vendor stores into the charge of the Board involves no change in the law so far as customers are "concerned. It means I hope better service all round but a medical prescription is required for the maximum quantity of one quart of liquor, one dozen porter etc., and the doctor is under the same obligation as before to furnish such presciption only when he believes the liquor necessary for the health of the patient. His duty is laid down in Section 51 of the Ontario Temperance Act. The physician may also give a similar prescription up to six ounces of liquor upon a druggist.

There seems to be an impression abroad that some radical change has been made in the Ontario Temperance Act whereby liquor can be more easily obtained.
