GORDON, DAVID WILLIAM. (Vancouver Island.)

Grandson on paternal side of John Gordon, who emigrated from Coventry, Eng., to India, and thence to America; served in the Royalists Forces during the Revolutionary war, removed with other U.E. Loyalists to Can. and finally settled in the Township of Camden. Co. of Kent, Ont. S. of Michael Gordon, who with his brothers served in the Canada Militia, under Gen. Brock at the taking of Detroit; was at the Battle of Chrysler's Farm, and other engagements during the war of 1812, 13 and 14. His residence and crops were
