on which was ascided the destiny of so great a country as Canada should be sacred to the memory of those she fell in the memorable struggle and should be placed under the joint guardianchip of the two reces contacting there for victory, and from mich the Canadian colony is apring. You will heer during the next fer months, as the great celebration of Camada approaches, much that will remind you of the great deeds and great names to which I have briefly referred. You will understan better the meaning of the colebration and the motives of those who have acreemed the setting apart of the battleground if you will study well the history of our country, and will come in time to approciate the full effect of its bearing on the Empire and even on the world at large.

Here in Ottawa under the range of the magnificient legislative houses of the Bominion, with the great names of our statesmen past and present ever before you, their features and figures familiar to you in many cases from day to day on the city streets, and with abundant evidence in our own city of the effective union of the two races whose struggles constitute so large all element in our history, it would be strange indeed if more than in most places there was not a disposition growing from year to year to preserve and cherish every that may be gathered from the pages of our history.
