A FATAL EXPLOSION.

Three Men Killed and Six Injured—New York Tragedy.

New York, July 28.—Three men are dead and six injured, one perhaps fatally, as the result of the blowing out of a cylinder head of an engine attached to an ammonia pump in the Jacob Ruppert Brewing Company's ice plant on Alexander avenue yesterday. One hundred and fifty men were at work at the time, and as soon as the engine stopped working, the ammonia flowed from the pump, the fumes spreading to all parts of the building. Patrolman David J. Goss was overcome by the fumes while rescuing unconscious employees from the building, and his injuries may prove fatal. The dead are—Otto Smith, engineer; John Vincinsky, fireman, and Chas. Carpenter, an employee. All were overcome by the fumes.

The Kirkpatrick Memorial Fountain Presented.

Kingston, July 28.—The reception to the home comers concluded last night, being a gratifying success. Fine weather favored the affair, and thousands of the visitors fully enjoyed the outing. Many sports were held in the morning, followed in the afternoon by a general programme, the evening being taken up by a band concert in Macdonald Park, display of fireworks and an illumination.

Mr. J. B. Penne, M.P.P., Chairman of the General Committee, was the recipient of two gifts, one a handsome silver coffee urn and bowl by subscribers to the Kirkpatrick memorial, and a loving cup by the Toronto Old Boys' Association, as a testimony of their appreciation of his good work. Mayor Bell presided at the presentation of the Kirkpatrick memorial fountain, which was handed over by Mr. Penne, and accepted by Mr. H. A. Calvin, M.P., and Mr. M. Avery, M.P., in behalf of the county Senator Sullivan, and Mr. Andrew Pattullo, M.P. also spoke. Lady Kirkpatrick was present.

COAL MINING RESUMED.

Dominion No. 1 Mine that Was on Fire Now Producing.

Glacé Bay, C.B., July 28.—Coal was mined at Dominion No. 1, the first since the fire. The mine is employing about 150 men. The place where the fire originated has not yet been reached. Four powerful pumps will be added at once to those now in operation.

MR. HAYS WILL SIGN TO-DAY.

The Grand Trunk Pacific Contract is Completed.

Ottawa, July 28.—The Grand Trunk Pacific contract has been finally completed, and now awaits the signature of Mr. C. M. Hays, who will be here to-day. If that gentleman signs the contract upon its submission to him, the salient features will be embodied in resolutions to be given notice of to-morrow, and the country will then be made officially aware of the Government's propositions. The resolutions will be introduced by Hon. W. S. Fielding, as they involve financial obligations, but the speech explanatory of the Government's policy will be delivered by the Prime Minister. The date fixed for this is Thursday next. It will probably be a much more extended address than has been heard from Sir Wilfrid within recent years, and may occupy some hours.
