SAN JOSE SCALE.

SAN JOSE SCALE.

The following is the formula that has proved successful in California according to the statement of Frank Dexter in the Farm Journal. It is cheap, easily applied, and if effectual, is many times better than the sulphur, lime and salt remedy. The caustic soda mentioned can be purchased in quantity at about 3 1-2 cents per pound. To destroy the scale proceed as follows: As soon as the leaves fall, the trees should be closely pruned. Saw out every limb that can be spared, and cut out the smaller limbs and twigs until the tree looks thin. Out the centre out well so that the spray can enter and the sun afterwards. Commence pruning as soon as the fruit is gathered, but do not spray with the leaves on. Gather and burn the cuttings soon after pruning. Draw the earth away from the trunk, down to the roots and brush the trunk. If the bark is rough it should be scraped. Dissolve one pound of caustic soda—78 per cent.—in every six gallons of water. In spraying, wet every part of the tree. Spray when there is no wind and finish not later than March lst in this climate or February 1st in warm climates. Repeat after a rain, or in two weeks, with no rain. This wash will not injure any kind of fruit tree, if but on when the tree is dormant. The soda should be crushed or ground. If uncrushed it is hard to reduce. Let every grower try this method this spring and good results must follow. The sulphur, lime and salt remedy is being discarded in California, except after the rainy season has ended.
