VENNOR, the "Weather Prophet," says of the Winter of 1878-9,—“Unless I am greatly mistaken, the setting in of the Winter of 1878-9 will be as marked for its unusual *earliness* as was that of 1877-8 for its extreme lateness. Navigation will close *early*, and will not open until *late*, so that the winter will be a long one. There will, in all probability, be an abundance of snow during the fore and latter part of the season; but, judging from the number and severity of our thunder storms in the summer of 1878, I look for a warm and singularly open *Term*.”

GOOSE-BONE WEATHER PREDICTIONS.

The Prophecy of the goose-bone does not extend beyond the year in which the goose was hatched, and the prediction is for the three winter months only. Take the breast bone of a last spring's goose and divide it into three equal parts, and the different divisions will represent December, January and February. The breast bone of a goose is translucent, and if clear when held up to the light, the weather will be mild and pleasant; but if covered with cloud-like blots it will be gloomy and cold; the heavier the blots the colder will be the weather.

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
