The contents of New-York papers of Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, received since our last, are not important. The commercial intelligence of the latest date will be found in another columa.

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London and Liverpool papers to the 19th ultimo were received at the Exchange yester-ary, through the kindness of Captain Robinson of the ship *Caurd & Lion*, who, but for the arrival of the *Liverpool*, would thus have fur-nished us with later intelligence from England. As it is, the papers brought by Captain Robin-on fill a histus in the files per steam-ship, but we do not find anything new in them.

The paper from the Lower Provinces, brought by the Eastern Mail, which arrived yesterday afternoon in due course, are princi-pally occupied with details of the late calamibrought yesterday attension in due course, are princi-pally occupied with details of the late calami-tous fire at St. John, New Brunswick. We seen that the citizens of St. John have re-quested the Lieut. Governor to convec the Legislature with the least possible delay; and that the conduct of the military has been most examplary.

The papers agree, substantially, in the fol-lowing account of the origin of the fire :--

"Originated, as is reported, from the care-lessness of a boy, who was drawing ardent spirit from a cask, and who suffered his candle to comein contact either with the spirit, or with a pile of *cakum*, which was very improperty placed on the top of the cask."

A private letter received in Queber, states A private letter received in Quebee, states that insurances to the amount of £50,000 on the property destroyed had been effected in the United States and in Europe, leaving a loss to the Province of New Brunswick of £150,000, all accounts agreeing in the estimate of £200,000. I will lose no time in consulting Her Ma-jesty's Executive Council upon the expediency of now calling the Legislature together, for the purpose of considering the remedies proper to be applied to the existing state of things in this City, and I will willingly give my concur-rence and assent to Legislature relief—(whe-ther by way of loan, subject to such arrange-ments for ultimate re-payment as may he deemed proper or otherwise,) being alforded to such of the sufferers where circumstances may require it,-but above all for prescribing such conditions as shall effectually secure the re-construction of these buildings, and the future construction of these buildings, in the future construction of all others in this city, upon a principle of greater security. This I cannot

but regard as a measure of d-ep importance /o the best interest of this Commercial City, and I accordingly do not doubt that it will be readily acquiested in by all classes of the community.
