

HARROW, ONT.—David Foster intends building a residence.

WINDSOR MILLS, QUE.—The Canada Paper Co. will commence next week to rebuild the pulp mill.

COWAL, ONT.—J. B. Coates will move his stove and hoop mill to Dutton and make improvements thereto.

PERTH, ONT.—On July 13th the ratepayers will vote on a by-law to raise \$30,000 for construction of sewers.

PARRY SOUND, ONT.—A by-law will likely be submitted to the ratepayers to raise \$10,000 for waterworks improvements, including installation of electric power at the pumping station.—The construction of the substructure of the Seguin

river bridge will be proceeded with at once.

COLLINGWOOD, ONT.—Bids received by W. Williams up to 4th inst. for purchase of following debentures: Water front property, \$25,000; road machinery, \$5,000; sewer, \$1,000; Collegiate Institute, \$800; land, \$6,000.—The Imperial Wire & Nail Co. are preparing to commence building operations.—R. WINNIPEG, MAN.—D. Smith has taken tenders on a building for Percy A. Crump.—H. S. Griffith, architect, desires tenders by July 3rd for addition to general hospital.—The erection of the new Lands Titles Office will be commenced immediately.—Turnbull & McManus will build a sash and door warehouse on the Citizens' rink property.—Two sites for suburban fire halls have been decided upon.

ST. JOHN, N. B.—The building of the Portland Methodist church has been postponed until a later date.—The Y. M. C. A. directors will likely select a site for new building at an early date, although it is improbable that construction work will be begun until next spring.—It is understood that the erection of a modern drill hall in this city is again under consideration. The proposed site is the Chipman property on Chipman Hill.

STRATFORD, ONT.—Plans are nearing completion for the improvements to the hotel building of the Windsor Hotel Co., and tenders will be invited shortly.—Thomas Hepburn, architect, is preparing plans for a one-storey brick boat house, 80x22 feet, for the Victoria Lake Co., of which G. G. McPherson is a director.—A number of leading citizens have formed a company to build several dwellings in this city.—It is reported that the C. P. R. will spend \$1,000,000 on improvements to their shops here.

MONTREAL, QUE.—The Montreal-Longueuil Bridge Co. has been incorporated, capital \$3,000,000, to build a bridge across the St. Lawrence river three miles below the Victoria bridge.—Extensive improvements are to be made to the Savoy Hotel, Victoria street.—Tenders will be received at the city clerk's office up to July 9th for supply of flagstone for sidewalks.—The Canadian Rubber Co. propose remodeling their entire plant and putting in new machinery.—A movement is on foot to erect a building for the King's Daughters' Creche.—The Canadian Pacific Railway propose establishing a private waterworks system for their car shops.—Saxe & Archibald, architects, are preparing plans for a third public bath, which will be built in St. Louis ward. Tenders invited probably this week.—It is stated on good authority that plans have been prepared by a New York architect for an expensive apartment house to be built on Sherbrooke street.—Building permits have been granted as follows: J.
