Charles A. Dunning Tells Manufacturers of Chances -- Warns them of Danger

THE TARIFF QUESTION

ures Association That Unless East-erners Harken to Needs of West a Tariff Revolution Will Come when Basis of Power Shifts.

That the interests of the eastern manufacturer and western agriculturist are the same, and that the possibility of keeping this country a United Canada depends on an early realization of this fact was the thesis of an address delivered to the Canadian Manufacturers' Association yesterday by Mr. Charles A. Dunning, manager of the Saskatchewan Co-operative Elevator Company, Limited.

The speaker stated that, in the face of this important fact, it became necessary that the leaders of these two industries should bear in mind the position of the other in deciding any of the important issues of the day, and that the following of this principle was the only way to prevent a future serious disagreement between these two parts of our country which would at least assume the dimensions of a tariff revolution.

Mr Dunning then gave reasons who mixed farming was impracticable throughout the larger pair of the west, and he pointed out in what ways the eastern manufacturers could be of assistance in solving the problems which he had outlined.

The present belief that the interests of the eastern manufacturer and of the western agriculturist are diametrically opposed is a delusjon," said the speaker. "The interests of the two are the same. The reason for the present delusion lies in the rocky belt of land in Northern Ontario which stretches between the eastern manufacturing section. What is needed in interest of these two industries is for them to get together with their feet under the same table and get acquainted."
