THAW GOES BACK HOME.

Trust Company Said to Have Landed C.N.R. \$5,000,000 Loan.

New York, June 11.—Having secured the consent of the State of New York, Henry Thaw will visit his old home in Pittsburgh, to which he has been a stranger since a brief time before he killed Stamford White on the Madison Square Roof Garden, the night of June 25, 1906. While in Pittsburgh, where his presence is required as a witness in the orphan's court of Allegheny County, Thaw will not be at liberty under bail, although he will have a measure of freedom. During his stay there he will be in the custody of a United States Marshall.
