

Accept Demand

Amsterdam, Jan. 12.—Leon Trotzky, the Bolsheviki foreign minister, at the conference at Brest-Litovsk yesterday said that in order not to leave any possibility in the fight for peace unutilized, the Russian delegation accepted the demand that the negotiations be continued at Brest-Litovsk.

The chairman of the Russian delegation said that in full ac-cord with their former resolution, the Russians desired to continue the peace negotiations, quite apart from the fact whether or not the Entente powers participated

Trotzky said he had noted the statement of the Central pow-ers that the basis of a general peace as formulated in their de-claration of December 25, was null and void and added:

"We adhere to the principles of democratic peace as proclaim-ed by us."
