Boyd is supposed to have been working a double-cross on the ondon man, and, of course,

"Billy" Boyd, the man arrested in connection with the case, has figured in some very unsavory cases. He is known as one of the shrewdest men in the Dominion, and his "jobs" in connection with foot racing, at which he is considered very fast, are well known. On several occasions he has been in trouble with the police.—London Free Press.

Buenos Ayres, Dec. 14.—A treaty of peace between the Government of Paraguay and the revolutionists was signed Monday night by President Ezcurria and Gen. Ferreira.
