Montreal Live Stock.

MONTREAL, June 3.—(Special.)—At the Montreal stock yards west end market, the receipts of live stock for the week ended June 1 were 1202 cattle, 136 sheep and lambs, 4622 hogs and 1556 calves, while the offerings for local consumption this morning were 700 cattle, 50 sheep and lambs, 2613 hogs and 140 calves.

The strong undertone which has prevailed in the market for cattle during the past three weeks still continues to be the main feature of the situation and prices this morning scored another advance of 1/4c to 1/2c per lb. and the indications at present are that they will go still higher in the near future. The high prices are solely on account of short supplies here and the scarcity of good to choice stock.

Choice heifers sold to-day at 6 1/2c to 6 3/4c; calves, at 6 1/2c to 6c; fat, at 6 1/2c to 5 1/2c; milk cows, at 4 1/2c to 4 3/4c, and lower grades at 4c to 4 1/2c per lb.

There was no further change in the hog situation. Supplies were large, with over 2000 on the market, but a number of these had been contracted for by packers last week. The price of selected lots were made freely at \$7.75.

Receipts of sheep are commencing to increase. Prices to-day were 1c per lb. lower than a week ago. Sales for export account were made at 4 1/2c to 5c per lb. The demand for spring lambs is good at \$4 to \$6 each, and an active trade continues in calves at from \$2 to \$3 each.

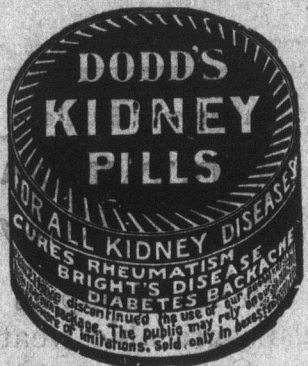

Toronto, June 4.—What looked like a well-planned hold-up took place just east of the Hunt Club premises on the Kingston road last night at 9:30 o'clock. John H. Richardson and his son, Fred, who is connected with Scarborough Beach, were going to their home at Highland Creek in an automobile, when they noticed two men with a lantern in the roadway.

The Richardsons stopped the auto to see what was the matter, when the men, who were masked, drew revolvers and demanded their money.

One of the men held them at the revolver point until his companion went through their pockets and searched the automobile.

Everything of value was taken, and the stripped autoists proceeded to the Half-Way House, where they notified the city police by phone. These communicated with County Constable J. T. Brown, who hurried to the scene, arriving there three-quarters of an hour after the robbery. He believes that he knows the perpetrators of the deed. Constable Burns was also engaged on the case.

SHORTHAND.

The Quality That Appears to Be Lacking in All Systems.

The fatality of all systems of shorthand is that what seems easy to the eye of filial piety may be terribly difficult to the cold gaze of a stranger. Of the innumerable systems of shorthand that were the vogue a century ago how many survive today? asks a London writer. Fame and fortune still await the man or woman who can invent a system that will appeal to the reader as effectively as to the original writer. Perhaps if we were to rediscover the lost shorthand writing of the ancient Romans we might find ourselves on the road toward a solution of the problem.

For the Romans were on affectionate terms with shorthand. Did not Suetonius, speaking of Calligula, express surprise that an emperor of so many promising parts should nevertheless be an ignoramus in shorthand, and did not Titus Vespasianus pride himself on his facility in the use of stenography both for business and amusement? So fond was he of the
