THE AFTERMATH

There are several stories in circulation as a result of the election. It is stated that a local liveryman when the Conservatives wished to hire his hack for Thursday night asked \$20 for it. The winners had to explain that they didn't want to buy it nor did they wish him to wait three years for his money, like he had to do when the Grits hired it last election night.

Another incident occurred election day. About noon a man was brought to the hospital from Raleigh. A Grit doctor heard of it and called up the hospital and asked a Liberal nurse to find out if he had voted, and if he was a Grit or Tory. On learning he was a Grit, the enthusiastic nurse sent the sick man away back to the Middle Road, Raleigh, to vote.

A Conservative worker had been hurt about noon on St. Clair street. He was taken to the hospital unconscious, but about this time he began to recover. A Conservative nurse went to him as soon as she learned of the departure of the Grit patient voter and was going to send the Conservative worker to the polls. She however, found that he had voted early.

CALLS MINISTER LIAR.

An Exciting Scene in French Chamber of Deputies.

Paris, Nov. 5.—The Chamber of Deputies held a tumultuous session yesterday over renewed interpellations on the subject of the policy of War Minister Andre, alleging that he was personally cognizant of the system of spying upon officers. During the time when the Minister was making his reply there was a scene of intense confusion. He said that during the Dreyfus affair some officers perjured themselves in the hands of President Loubet, and he cited other instances showing intolerance and lack of discipline among officers. The Minister further declared that this was fomented by political and clerical agitators. During the manoeuvres, he added, a regimental colonel had dared to replace the tricolor by an ensign bearing the imperial colors. The War Minister's declaration caused a wild demonstration, Gen. Jacques exclaiming that the Minister lied. The President of the Chamber threatened to censure Gen. Jacques, who withdrew his words and the Minister continued his statement amid great excitement.

Interfered With Justice.

Vancouver, B.C., Nov. 5.—The assizes which have been in progress for the past fortnight, were concluded yesterday afternoon, though not all the sentences have been pronounced. Sihivid Chion of Nawhatti, an Indian, was sentenced to nine months imprisonment for interfering with the course of justice in advising Indians to keep the murder of the Indian woman Kivesitt a secret.

Clarence Miller was sentenced to ten years for forging a postoffice order, and F. X. Gaultier for three years for stealing from his partners in a logging business.

Troops Charge Students.

Innsbruck, Austria, Nov. 5.—The rioting of the students at the university has become so serious during the night that troops with fixed bayonets marched into the midst of the German demonstrators. An artist named Pexey was killed by a bayonet thrust through the heart and many persons were wounded. Eight Germans and ten Italians were wounded. The building occupied by the Italian faculty of the university was wrecked.

Toronto Boxing Tournament.

Toronto, Nov. 5.—Twenty-two entries have already been made for the annual Fall city amateur boxing championships that will be decided here beginning Thanksgiving night. The outside candidates include a heavyweight from Alliston.

Infantry Charges a Mob.

Breslau, Prussian Silesia, Nov. 5.—Three thousand Poles marched through the streets of Czesochowa, Russian Poland, Wednesday, as a protest against the mobilization. The chief of police and gendarmes ordered the paraders to disperse, but they refused to do so and continued to sing Polish songs. A detachment of infantry then charged the mob with bayonets, with the result that six persons were killed and twenty were wounded.

Bank Robbers Escape.

Cody, Wyo., Nov. 5.—The Cody Bank robbers have escaped. Members of the posse sent from here who have returned say that the timber in which the outlaws took refuge has been thoroughly beaten and no trace of the men found. The pursuit has not been abandoned, however.

Carnegie Re-elected.

Edinburgh, Nov. 5.—Andrew Carnegie has been unanimously re-elected Lord Rector of St. Andrew's University.

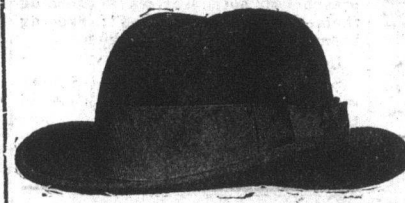
