## Cooneyites a Moral and Well-living Sect.

From those with intimate knowledge of the "go-preachers" nothing but kind words can be heard. No charge of immorality has ever been proven against them. The Montreal Star says:

A paragraph dated from Dublin recently appeared in The Star to the effect that a sect known as the "Cooneyites" or "Irish Mormons," had been instrumental in kidnapping and sending to Salt Lake, the young daughter of a wealthy Irish farmer.

A local correspondent having communicated with the detective director of the Royal Irish Constabulary, that official writes stating that the kidnapping story is "absurd and absolutely without foundation," adding:

"The Cooneyites are a strictly moral and well-living sect, strongly opposed to Mormonism, and having many sympathizers in the Orthodox Churches."

Mr. Fisher's Gifts to Woodstock.

The formal opening of the Fisher Memorial School and the presentation of the portrait of the late James McCoy to the school took place Thursday night in the assembly room of the school, Woodstock, before a large audience. Mr. Carvell spoke briefly of the life of Mr. Fisher, and presented the keys of the school to the chairman, Mr. Belyon, who accepted on behalf of the school board.
