the United States Thaw did not take his eyes off the reader. In his right hand Thaw held two little pennants of the fair which a little girl had thrust upon him. There were forty persons in the judge's chamber. The court's reading was slow, and while there were indications that he would sustain the writ, it was not until the last few paragraphs that this became

The court held, briefly, that Thaw was being confined illegally and that John Boudreau, chief of police of Coaticook, the petitioner, had a right to demand the prisoner's release. Thaw remained dazed for about three minutes.

The crowd began to leave the judge's chamber in silence. The followed aimlessly. As he crossed the threshold Blake Robertson, tage ped him on the shoulder and placed him officially under arrest as an undesirable alien.

The crowd then surged out of the building and it was announced the Thaw would be taken immediately to Coaticook for a hearing.

It was reported today that Mrs. Mary Copley Thaw, mother of the fugitive would soon arrive in Sherbrooke to arrange with counsel for their fees and expenses.
