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Henry M. Stevens

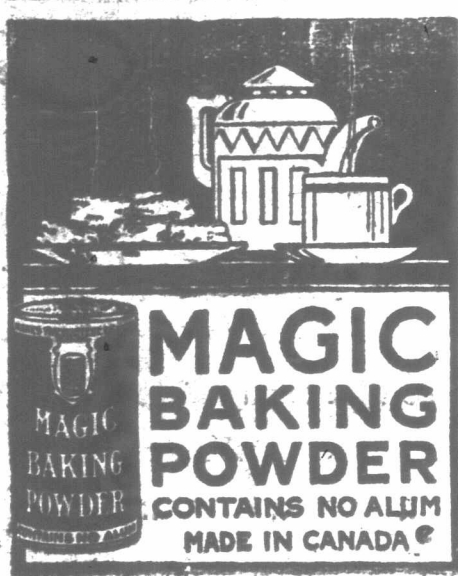
On Monday afternoon Henry M. Stevens died at the home of his son, Fred H. Stevens, with whom he has lived most of the time during the past few years. He had been growing feeble from advancing age and since October had been confined to the house. He had no disease or physical disablement other than that consequent upon the years of life to which he had attained. He kept his bed during the last two weeks of his life and his end was very peaceful. His wife predeceased him a year and two weeks, and he is survived by two sons, H. Percy Stevens in Riverside, Calif., and Fred H. Stevens, Hartland, and Miss Marion Stevens of Hartland is the only daughter. The funeral was held yesterday afternoon at the residence, Rev. George Kincaid, late pastor of the United Baptist church preaching from the words of the prophet Zechariah: "And at eventide there shall be light." The other clergymen of the village assisted in the services and a representative gathering of village people were present to pay last respects to one whose love towards his fellowmen embraced all creeds. In early life he became a member of the Baptist church and was loyal to its teachings.

Mr. Stevens was born at Fredericton on June 6, 1837, and came from Loyalist stock. He lived at the capitol until he grew to manhood, when he came to Somerville, where he had his home all the intervening years. In his life work he was an architect and builder of more than ordinary ability and many fine structures stand today that were reared at his hands. One of the last pieces of work he engaged in was as one of the crew that erected the beautiful Elks' Club in Houlton, on which he put the last finishing touch. He was more an artist, however, than a mechanic. He loved the beautiful, even as he loved the good, and he had no mean talent as a painter of landscapes in oil. To him the whole world was beautiful, and he never ceased to wonder at the marvellous work of his Creator. He loved Nature, and he was a friend not alone to all mankind but to every one of the dumb creatures of the earth. He was kind and generous to those in trouble and distress and in the active days of his life he was a man much looked up to. He had a wide circle of friends, not only in the immediate vicinity but in the various towns and cities where during his life time he engaged in work.
