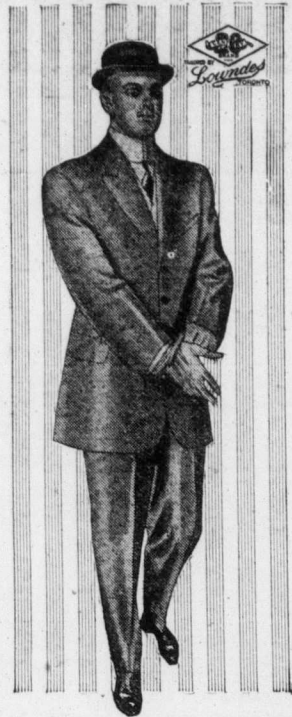

Big Fields in Some Classes

Altogether it Looks Like a Good Three Days Racing Programme --- Oswego Boy and Orwell Bell Winners at Halifax---Fox Lands Peter Reed Ahead Again.

There will probably be a card of seven events for the three days racing during the Fredericton 1911 Exhibition.

The fact that a number of the horses are laid up owing to injuries made it impossible to fill the free for all trot, but the other races will have the finest fields offered here for a long time, including a couple of Upper Canadian stables not yet seen in the Maritime Provinces.

In some of the classes there will be as many as nine and ten starters and the list of entries which will be published the first of the week, after being approved by the directors at a meeting to be held at the Barker House this afternoon, will be a surprise to many of the followers of the racing game.

FOX HAS REPEATER.

Peter Reed Wins Again for the Old Boy, This Time at Waterville Fair.

Waterville, Me., Sept. 1.—Alfred Nelson took the 3.00 trot or pace at the Central Maine fair yesterday, winning the fourth and final heat of the race continued from Wednesday's programme. Straight heats gave the 2.13 stake to Queen Inez, the 2.24 class to Grace Braden and the 2.30 trotting stake to Peter Reed.

The battle of the day was the 2.18 trot. Crescello, winner of the first two heats, succumbed to Roland Axtell in the third, but Roan Bird proved better than either of them in the three following heats. The summary:

THE HALIFAX MEETING.

Excellent Races Thus Far at the Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition—Yesterday's Winners.

The races in connection with the Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition at Halifax are proving highly successful and some high class sport is being furnished.

In yesterday's racing Oswego Boy and Orwell Bell were the winners and today there are three races carded, the 2.25 trot and pace, 2.20 trot and 2.15 trot and pace, and there is particular interest in the 2.20 trot as it marks the first start of Jack Sullivan's trotter Rapidly at the meeting.

The press despatch story of yesterday's races:

Halifax, Sept. 1.—The Nova Scotia Exhibition track had two races this afternoon—the 2.40 pace stake and 2.30 trot. The pace had nine starters and was won in straight heats by Oswego Boy, driven by A. W. Rideout, of Medford, Mass. He led from start to finish. The trot had seven starters and was well contested. Orwell Bell, the winning horse, placed Jack Leonard to drive Alquire in the third heat, but he did not improve the horse's position.

I look to see some really classy racing at the Exhibition. There will be the usual number of horses starting but so long as there are such long jumps in the circuit of fairs there will always be trouble in getting the entries all the tracks deserve.
