SENT DOWN

Private Floyd Matchett of the 132nd Battalion was sentenced to two years imprisonment with hard labor in the Dorchester Penitentiary for illegally absenting himself from the Battalion. He had given himself up of his own free will and had returned to his Battalion, and for this reason the sentence was suspended.
Private C. E. Corrier and Private J. D. Corrier were sentenced by the civil authorities here at Sussex to two (2) years imprisonment with hard labor in the Dorchester Penitentiary for absenting themselves from the Battalion without leave. These men came from the Campbellton district. Private E. Recovering from his wounds he returned to the front only to be killed. He was a native of Hampton, where a widow mother lives.

For instance:

"Book-keeper wanted, with experience or convalescent Hospital training. Must not have more than one leg, and may have less."

"A pushing salesman wanted, with experience, if he left he other in Flanders."

"Gardener's job open to an ex-soldier needing out-door life."

"Munitions making, highest pay. Injured soldiers preferred, if able for the work."

The Military Hospitals Commission is doing its best to fit our convalescent soldiers for whatever work they are best suited for, but when they are ready to come out, restored as far as possible to health and strength, employers should come forward to receive them.

The Provincial Commissions and Committees aim at getting work for the returned soldiers, but every manufacturer or other employer should co-operate with these organizations.—Exchange.

ANNUAL MEETING OF N. B. AND P. E. I. W. C. T. U.

The tenth annual convention of the N. B. and P. E. I. W. C. T. U. was held in Moncton, Tuesday the last day last week, many delegates in attendance.

The report showed 21 unions with 500 active members and 19 honorary members. Receipts during year were \$1,401.48, expenditures \$1,075.51, balance of \$325.97.

Many valuable papers were read. Thursday morning, Rev. W. D. Wilson, secretary of the Dominion Alliance, addressed the meeting, in the interest of the repeal of the Scott Act. He claimed that in the last twenty-six months Canada had lost more men through strong drink than by fighting for the Empire. A hearty vote of thanks was then tendered to Rev. Mr. Wilson, for his splendid address.

Mrs. C. M. Lawson moved and Mrs. Stevenson seconded the following resolution: "Moved that this convention put itself on record as being in hearty sympathy and co-operation with the work of the Dominion Alliance."

Amended resolutions adopted were:

Pledging cooperation with other temperance orders, urging crusade against white slavery, deploring the present war and terrible acts of inhumanity connected therewith and praying God that peace may soon prevail, deploring the sending of tobacco and cigarettes to soldiers and recommending Dr. Grenfell's work and the Sailors' Aid.

Following officers were elected:—

Pres., Mrs. Margaret McWha, St. Stephen; Vice-Pres., Mrs. J. S. Perry, Summerside; Cor. Sec., Mrs. L. R. Hetherington, Riverside; Rec. Sec., Mrs. T. A. Clarke, Newcastle; Treas., Mrs. A. C. M. Lawson, Fredericton; Sec. of L. T. L.—Mrs. A. Laughlin, St. Stephen; Auditor—Mrs. W. M. Burns, Fredericton.

Next year the Union will meet in St. Stephen.

MUNICIPAL SKATING RINKS

Their Establishment Justified as a Measure of Health and Public Safety.

Open air possesses a fascination for the Canadian youth unsurpassed by any other attraction. One result of this yearning has been the organization of the playground movement in many of our cities and towns. Wherever met with immediate success. Regular play inculcates lessons of discipline intermixed with pleasure, and creates a lasting impression upon the young.

In the majority of cases the playgrounds were originally established by public spirited citizens who have the welfare of the children at heart. The success of the movement has led to its adoption by municipalities, who are now making appropriations for maintenance.

Our winter, however, militates against a long season for play ground, and in the cold weather, substitute attraction, viz. the skating rinks, should be provided. Municipal outdoor skating rinks have many advantages, not the least being the counter-attraction to the pleasures of hanging on skis or coasting on the public streets, both dangerous practices.

Open-air rinks can be provided at very small cost. School grounds, vacant lots or other open spaces may be used. The area should be enclosed with boards eight inches wide, set vertically, and supported by wooden posts driven into the ground on the outside. The fire department can flood the rinks and a few of the street employees can keep the ice clear of snow and preserve order.

The municipal skating rink is a wholly commendable investment of public funds; it supplies pleasure and recreation to the masses, as an offset to the provision of good roads for the owners of automobiles or other conveyances for pleasure. If, however, it serves no other purpose than taking children of the street, it well repays the expenditure as a measure of public safety.—D.

News of the World War

Day by Day

Oct. 12th

London—British delivered an attack on the low heights which intervene between the British front and the Bapaume-Peronne road, and captured a number of prisoners.

Petrograd—In Dobrudja an enemy air squadron dropped bombs on Constantza (the principal Rumanian Black Sea port) and also poisoned sweets and garlic infected with cholera bacilli.

London—Greece has, under protest, accepted the Allies demand for the surrender of her entire fleet, and the transfer of possession has already begun. Allies will also take over the Greek mails, railways and telegraphs.

Petrograd—Three German gas attacks launched against the Russian position in front of the Uskul Bridge fortifications (western Russian front) on Oct. 8th were unsuccessful. The defenders destroyed the gas apparatus. A bridge erected by the Germans over the river Balduka in the region of Belauca village, was destroyed by Russian artillery.

In the Caucasus nothing of importance occurred.

Rome—The resumption of Austro-German submarine attacks is causing grave concern in Italy, where the prices of coal, wheat, lumber, scrap iron and other imports have trebled within a year, owing to the prohibitive freight rates. Coal now costs \$50 a ton.

Ottawa—Early Sunday morning, Oct. 2nd, Canadian troops attacked the German positions upon a frontage of 3,500 yards and to an average depth of about 500 yards. They entered a large part of their objective, and killed the enemy's trenches with German dead. Meeting overwhelming forces, the Canadians were forced to retire, many falling before they were back to their former positions. The men who took part were evidently West-ern battalions.

Rome—From Aug. 6th to Oct. 12th Italians captured 30,881 prisoners on the Austrian front.

Oct. 13th

The Russian government has released twenty-one Swedish vessels, which have been held in Russian harbors for the last two years.

Petrograd—German troops yesterday along the Shara River, north of the Pinsk Marshes, captured a trench section, but were subsequently expelled with heavy losses.

Berlin—Nine Allied aeroplanes of a squadron which attempted to pass over Southern Germany yesterday were shot down.

Athens—Control of the port of Piraeus, the seaport of Athens, has been taken over by the French. No manifests from this port will hereafter be valid without visa by the Allies.

Paris—Forty French and British aeroplanes dropped four tons of explosives last night on the Mauser works at Oberdorf in Germany, on the Neckar River. Six German machines defending the works were shot down.

Berlin—The Rumanians have been expelled from further portions of Transylvania and are being pursued by the Austro-German forces. German

aeroplanes, during the night of October 9-10, successfully bombed Russian troops at Constantza.

Rome—Italian troops made considerable progress on the Carso, capturing ground between the first enemy line, and the second one. The western slopes of Monte Pecinka and the first houses of Lovizza and Hudlog were reached and 400 prisoners were captured, including ten officers.

London—The British troops advanced on the front extending from Guedecourt to Lesboufs (about one and one-half miles) in severe fighting north of the Somme last night. Gains were also made northwest of Guedecourt, and 150 prisoners were taken. The Germans have withdrawn their heavy guns from one and a half to five miles behind their Somme front.

Oct. 14th

London—Today south of the Anise (Western front) the British improved their position near Schawen Re doubt, and took 200 prisoners.

Paris—The prisoners taken yesterday numbered 1,100.

Bucharest—Prisoners taken by Rumanians to date number 15,041.

Oct. 15th

London—The British line has advanced slightly northwest of Guedecourt.

Berlin—At one point on the Somme district, British obtained a firm foothold. The French obtained a foothold in Genemouth.

Petrograd—Russian troops have stormed the Teuton trenches. Two machine guns were captured, and a number of prisoners taken. The Germans counter attacked fiercely, but they were repulsed with heavy losses.

Berlin—In the Carpathians the Germans recaptured the summit of Snietree, which was lost on September 21st. In the Kiribaba sector Austro-Hungarian troops gained advantages and took 444 prisoners.

Petrograd—The Russian submarine Tula, on October 12th, captured the Turkish ship thousand ton armed war transport Rodistko, near the Bosporus.

British Front in France—In completing the capture of the Schwaben Redoubt on the ridge above Thiepval, the British took 280 prisoners for a front of less than 300 yards.

Oct. 16th

Paris—Continuing their attacks on the Somme front last night, the French penetrated German positions at Sully-Saillies and Saillies. They occupied houses on each side of the road to Bapaume. The Germans made a violent counter-attack, and the fighting is still in progress.

London—The enemy has advanced into Roumania through the Torzger pass and the Rumanians are fighting on their own soil at Rucaru.

A Jewish British General (Springfield Republican)—The first Jew of British birth to attain the rank in the British army. Gen. H. S. Seligman, has just been gazetted brigadier-general. This is an astonishing bit of history in view of the supreme honors attained by Jews in British politics and on the bench. More significant, probably, of Jewish emancipation is the recent action of the War in approving the appointment as assistant advocate of a Jew whose candidacy had been frowned upon by the Ministry of Justice.
