LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

Hon. Mr. Forget, former Lieut. Governor of Saskatchewan, has been appointed Senator in succession to Senator Roy, of Edmonton, who goes to Paris as Canadian Commissioner.

While trying to liberate a pig which was caught under a picket fence, at Cobourg, Ont., on the 3rd, Lillian McKin, aged twelve, was knocked down and frightfully bitten by two sows.

Sir Francis Langelle, Chief Justice of the Superior Court of Quebec, has been appointed Lieut. Governor of that Province to succeed the late Sir A. P. Pelletier. Sir Francis has accepted.

Alfred Shrubbs defeated F. L. Cameron, Amherst, in the twelve mile race Saturday night last. He won his victory by a very narrow margin, however, his time being 1.16.13 and Cameron's 1.17.23.

Things seem to be reaching a critical stage in Mexico. Pressure by the insurgents is brought on President Diaz to resign office. The old man may be forced to, but he is very reluctant about it.

At a dinner given by Mr. R. L. Borden to the Conservative members at Ottawa and others the announcement was made that Messrs. McBride and Rogers would shortly enter Federal politics. It was also stated that the Conservative party will continue the fight against Reciprocity Agreement.

After Laurier departs for England on the 12th inst., and Parliament shall be adjourned for a space, the scene of political battle will change from the capital to the country. Members will arrange for public meetings in their constituencies, and Leaders will likely make more or less extensive tours. It is said Borden will tour the Prairie Provinces.

Six hundred and fifty girls, employed in a shirt factory in New York, rushed screaming for the stairs from the third and fourth floors at the sight of a burning awning fire below them. The congestion between the floors became terrific, and a hand rail on the stairway snapped and thirteen girls fell in a shrieking heap in the hallway between. Fourteen were injured.

One hundred and fifty women and girls, on the 11th floor of a lofty building in New York on the 4th, sprung from their seats when a burst of flame filled the room. The room organized a bucket brigade and fought the blaze to such good purpose that it was entirely extinguished when the firemen arrived. The girls were employed by Henry Co., and were drilled for weeks to meet just such emergency.

In the fire which destroyed the home of their parents in St. Sophie, Megantic County, Que., the five children of Phineas Patry perished late on Sunday night. With his wife, Patry had gone to visit some relatives in another part of the parish, and on their return late at night the parents found their home in flames. Notwithstanding all their efforts they could not save the unfortunate little ones whose charred remains were found yesterday among the debris.

On Sunday afternoon, April 30th, a poker game, played in a hay shed was the cause of the fire that swept Bangor, leveling almost four hundred buildings, causing loss of three lives and rendering thousands homeless. A number of men were playing poker in Green's hay shed. One of them dropped a lighted match on the floor, the loose hay burst into flames and in a moment the interior was ablaze. The card players had barely time to dash out.

A correspondent who returned to Shanghai from the famine-stricken districts of Northern China says that he found the conditions improved as a result of the relief work; but they are still very bad. The daily death-rate has decreased from several thousand in the middle of March to a few hundred. Many houses stand deserted, only the mud walls indicating that they were once tenanted. Children, who formerly were sold for fifty cents each, are now exchanged for a few pounds of grain. Women are selling themselves into slavery to provide support for their families.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

The A. W. Perry of the Plant Line arrived here on the first trip of the season yesterday afternoon. After discharging and loading freight she left for Boston this morning.

William Quail won the fifteen mile professional running race in New York, from a field of six competitors, in a fraction over 1 hour 22 minutes and 52 seconds. Tom Longboat was second, 300 yards behind the winner and 500 yards ahead of the third man.

A few days ago Mr. Stephen Brown, York, purchased a pair of steers from Bruce Hayden, Green wich, that were real beauties. They were rising three years and weighed together nearly 2,500 lbs. The seller and the purchaser are to be congratulated on handling stock of this description.

It is pleasing to know that Mr. Archibald J. McDonald, M. P. P., Georgetown, who had been seriously ill during the latter part of the Legislative session, had so far progressed towards recovery as to be able to return home on Thursday last. We hope that he shall in a very brief space be completely restored to health.

On Sunday last, Rev. Dr. McLellan preached in the Cathedral on the present laws and regulations of the Church regarding the Sacrament of Matrimony. In a powerful discourse he gave a plain and explicit interpretation of the Papal decrees: "Tametsi," "Provida," and "Ne Temere," issued by the church from time to time.

From all parts of Canada came reports of destructive forest fires. In the vicinity of Fredericton, N. B., several farm buildings have been destroyed; the air is filled with smoke and the situation is serious. From Winnipeg comes the intelligence that prairie fires are raging from Dauphin to Prince Albert a distance of a hundred miles. These have been fanned for days by furious winds. At the village of Aylesford, Nova Scotia, sixteen buildings fully one third of the village was swept away by fire in two hours. Word comes also of destructive fires in different parts of the New England States.

The impression is growing at Ottawa that a general election will take place before Christmas. The tremendous amounts of money voted are regarded as indicative of an appeal to the people. The supplementary estimates, brought down Monday night, totalling seventeen millions, make things look like an election. Of the total amount over eight millions are changeable to capital. The supplementary estimates include \$150,000 for branch Lines from O'Leary to West Point and from Kensington to Stanley Bridge; \$35,000 for a Tunnel Survey; \$2,500 for Casempeck Wharf; \$1,250 for Graham's Pond repairs; \$6,500 for Grand River Wharf; \$5,000 for Naufrage Pond; \$5,000 for Southport wharf; \$500 for Montague warehouse; \$26,000 for Tracadie breakwater and \$6,000 for Wood Islands breakwater.
