### STRATHCONA WINS IN CLOSE GAME (Wednesday's Daily)

 Edmonton and Strathcona hockey teams have valid reasons for respecting each other today. They have met on two different occasions within a week and the honors have been pretty evenly divided. Edmonton won the first game on Strathcona ice, on Christmas day, and Strathcona won on Edmonton's ice yesterday. In the two games 27 goals have been scored, Edmonton taking 14 and Strathcona 13.

The game yesterday was good hockey and satisfied the spectators. Both teams played with more skill and speed than on Christmas day. Edmonton experienced some hard luck in the losses of several daring and vigorous tries by the forwards. Time after time by clever individual play and pretty combination attacks the puck was literally rained on the visitors goal, only to miss by a hair's breadth, and often making the post ring. Sutherland for the visitors was active and plucky, and although he stopped many shots it was not he who saved the score from going into two figures. It was hard luck for Johnson and Campbell, and possibly insufficient fighting in the last half. Hampton and McLeod, for Strathcona, were the stars, the former scoring five goals, while McLeod, tireless and vigilant, was always in evidence and a dangerous man to get possession of the rubber. ### EDMONTON TAKES FIFTH PLACE IN CANADA'S BUILDING

The totals of the building done in the principal cities of Canada during 1929 show Edmonton in Fifth place, leading Calgary, Regina, Brandon and all other cities in Western Canada except Winnipeg and Vancouver.  
 Edmonton's phenomenal growth is shown by the fact that the city's population has increased by 100 per cent in the last five years, and the figures show that the promise of a year ago has been fulfilled; that the capital of Alberta is developing into one of the leading cities of the Dominion. No other city shows an increase in percentage of gain over the past five years and no other city in Canada has a better promise for the year just opened.

When it was prophesied in the Bulletin in May of last year that the building in Edmonton for 1929 would total two million, the prophecy was treated lightly by the newspapers in other cities. The figures prove that the expectations have been practically fulfilled.  
 Building men of the city who are in the construction business predict that the building in Edmonton for 1929, aside altogether from municipal improvements or railroad work, will total four million. There is already building enough in sight to justify this prediction. The parliament buildings, the new office, the court house, and the Windsor hotel, which are already assured, will total one million and the residential building is expected to run close to two million, leaving only a million to be made up by down-town building factories and warehouses. This takes no count of all intents and purposes will be done outside the city limits, such as the packing plant, half a million, and the brewery, a quarter of a million.  
 One of the remarkable features of the year in Edmonton is the number of substantial and handsome residences that have been built. It is safe to say that although young as a building city, no other city of its size in Canada has as many comfortable homes as Edmonton.  
 Another satisfactory feature is the freedom from labor trouble. Only one building under construction, the disturbed building during 1929, and the outlook for 1930 was never better. The city, which is going to be the most important factor in the labor market during the present year, has already a fair wage clause which is similar to the Mulock bill, and there will be no trouble on city work as union hours and wages are recognized. The Trades and Labor Council and the Builders' Exchange both state that they are for peace and that a scale of rates will be arrived at before the building season opens.  
 Taken all in all the prospects for good building activity were never better than they are in Edmonton today, and the record of the past year could hardly have been more satisfactory.

 Chief Smart, of Calgary, estimates that there are a lot of buildings not yet recorded or improperly recorded. Among these are the Normal school, \$100,000; C. P. R. buildings, \$30,000; P. Burns buildings, \$100,000; brewery, \$75,000; Holy Cross hospital, \$50,000; and R. N. W. M. P., \$5,000, adding \$360,000 to the total and bringing the aggregate up to \$1,557,580.  
 The Calgary Herald on December 2nd published a building statement which claimed \$2,842,038 worth of building for the year, from Dec. 1st, 1929, to Dec. 1st, 1930, but all these figures included \$350,000 for the cement works, which are located at Exshaw, 50 miles from Calgary, \$50,000 for building in the suburbs, and \$0 per cent for under-valuation and non-registration. They are too obviously inflated to be of any use for the purposes of comparison.

Building for the Year Aggregates Close to Seventeen Million.  
 Montreal, always the first city in Canada, leads again this year in the

 The Queen City is the second in Canada in the amount of building done in the year 1929. There were 3,439 permits issued, representing an aggregate total of \$13,160,398.

### WINNIPEG'S WONDERFUL RECORD.

Crowds Toronto Close for 1926 and Totals Over Forty-Two Million in Four Years.  
 Winnipeg is the wonder city of the world in the matter of building. No city on the continent ever came near the same percentage of increase and kept it up so continuously. Los Angeles is the only city in America of about the same size that comes anywhere near being in Winnipeg's class. With only 100,000 of a population Winnipeg crowded Toronto with its 225,000, so close that there is just a question whether or not that the prairie capital is not in the lead.

### RURAL SCHOOL GROWTH

D. S. Mackenzie, deputy minister of Education, stated today that one-third as many school districts had been created since the organization of the province of Alberta as were in existence at the time of organization in the area included in the province of Alberta. The increase does not include towns or villages.

### THE SUNSET DOORWAY.

Vancouver Builds Four Million and Takes Fourth Place.  
 Vancouver, B.C., the Sunset Doorway of the Dominion is sharing in the general prosperity of Canada, and by her building records shows up in fourth place. In 1929 the building permits issued totalled \$4,380,460. Vancouver's growth during the past year has been phenomenal. At one time during the summer there were more than 40 business blocks under construction at one time. Pender street was changed in a few months from a back street to one of the city's principal thoroughfares. Granville street had most phenomenal development, and whole sections of the water front districts were rebuilt, while the business district on Hastings, the principal business street of the city, jumped 25 per cent. Vancouver looks forward to a big increase in the building next year.

### WHERE EDMONTON COMES IN.

Total Building Close to the Two Million Mark—Increase of Over 100 Per Cent.  
 The building permits issued for the year 1929 in the Edmonton building inspector's office totalled \$1,868,068, as against \$702,224 in 1928.
