GERMAN CLAIM ON RIGHT IN AIR RAID.

LONDON, To-day. Reuter's Amsterdam correspondent sends the following despatch from Berlin, giving the German official ver-sion of the airship raid on the English sion of the airship raid on the English coast. Our airships in order to attack the fortified town of Great Yarmouth, were obliged to fly over other towns from which it is stated they were fired at . These attacks were answered by throwing bombs. England has not right to be indignant as her flying machines and ships, and in broad daylight have attacked open towns such as Freiburg, Dares, Salem and Swakopmud. The air craft is acknowledged to be a legitimate weapon for carrying on modern warfare as long as their operations are conduct. ong as their operations are conducted in accordance with the rules of Inernational Law. This has been done by our dirigibles. The German nation is forced by England to fight for its existence and cannot be compelled to orego the employment of legitimate means of self-defence and will not do it relying upon her good rights.

HE PAST TWO MONTHS WAS FA-VOURABLE TO ALLIES, CLAIMS THE FRENCH OFFICIAL REPORT.
