Mr. Goodland's gift is greatly appreciated by the Lodge. The Scroll of Honour will be exhibited in the window of Messrs. Gray and Goodland to-day.

Call For Fifty Thousand Troops Coming Soon.

Ottawa, Aug. 30.—The return to Ottawa at the end of the week of Sir Robert Borden is expected to be productive of some interesting announcements with respect to those matters which have engaged his attention while abroad.

It is anticipated that following the plan of constantly increasing the contribution of Canada to the fighting forces of the Empire, there will be before long a call for forty or fifty thousand more troops, sufficient probably to maintain in the field two or three army divisions.

The intimation to this effect is not official, but the situation abroad and the issue involved make it very desirable, if not an absolute necessity. Any extra mobilization would be along lines identical with the past.

WHEAT TRANSPORTATION.

The question of transportation of the wheat crop and also that of taking it over and restricting its uses to British or Allied channels, has also been a very active subject of consideration, and in respect to this the Premier doubtless will have certain proposals to lay before his colleagues and Parliament. The subject is a very live one in the West particularly, and developments are awaited with great interest.

Another matter to be taken up at once is the one of extending the term of Parliament. The consensus of opinion here is that this will be done unless the Liberals strongly oppose it, in which event there would doubtless be a general election. The Liberal stand would be determined only when the proposal is made, but the present outlook is that they will agree to the principle of extension. Any difference therefore would arise over the duration of it. Cabinet Ministers are returning to the capital and by next week practically all of them will be here to deal with the various subjects arising from the Prime Minister's prolonged visit to the Old Country and the important conferences he has held there.

South Africa Helps East.

Pretoria, Aug. 11.—The Nyasaland Imperial Service Contingent, which was reviewed to-day before its departure for East Africa by Mr. Malan, Minister of Mines, is a splendid force of seasoned warriors. The contingent could have been recruited three times over. Colonel Moorhead is in command. Mrs. Louis Botha presented a standard with a springbok head on a yellow and blue ground. Mr. Malan, in a speech, said that the Union Government had readily acceded to the request of the Nyasaland Protectorate to raise a contingent for service in that country because Nyasaland was part of the same Empire as the Union and also a neighbouring country in Africa.—*Reuter.*

FOREIGN MAIL DUE.—A local express, bringing a large foreign mail, is due to reach the city to-night.

Germany's Maritime Murders.

London News and Leader:—The sole aim of all legitimate maritime operations is to weaken the power of the enemy for the conduct of the struggle. Only a childishly ignorant German will believe that Great Britain's power of carrying on the war can be seriously affected by the sinking of a few liners. This is so generally recognized even in Germany that it is still felt to be necessary to defend the sinking of the Lusitania by the repetition of the exploded fable that she was carrying vast supplies of munitions. But what is to be said of a nation which carries its doctrine of the destruction of enemy commerce to such lengths that it is prepared to sink a ship of which the complement and freight must from the circumstances be largely neutral, if by so doing loss can be caused to the enemy country? But Germany not merely does this; she does it while claiming to be fighting for "the freedom of the seas."

Australian War Census Bill.

Ottawa, Aug. 31.—Australia is going further than Canada by its War Census Bill. The object of it is to furnish the Government with complete and accurate knowledge of the forces it aspires to organize.

Every male citizen of fighting age is compelled to give an exact account of his physical condition, his social and industrial status and his military capacity. In addition there must be disclosed, in confidence, the nature, extent and value of every man's possessions. Australia's war outlay is computed at \$225,000,000 per annum.

New York, Aug. 31.—When arrested in Brooklyn on a Federal warrant charging forgery amounting to nearly \$5,000, Ignatius T. T. Lincoln, formerly a member of the British Parliament and a self-confessed German spy, to-day asked that his case be adjourned for a week. The request was granted.

The alleged forgery was committed in London. Lincoln said in court that the charge was one "trumped up" in order to get him back to England where, he said, he had reason to believe he would be shot as a spy.
