Now the German Socialists Obtain Their Lead.

Socialists control Germany to-day, owing to their party organization, which enabled them to carry their doctrines before the war, and the rise of Socialism may, to some extent, be explained by the country's industrial development and concentration of capital, it is, however, chiefly the result of the party organization. The general interest of the party is in the management of an executive committee has full power over all Social organizations in the country. In localities of any importance the party is grouped into political generally called electioneering party on a sound financial basis, and contributes to the party's treasury. A portion of this money is to defray the expenses of the party political clubs, another portion is allotted to the Socialist propaganda in the provinces, and the remainder is sent to the executive committee. The president of the party committee receives \$12 a year, the treasurer \$37 and the secretary \$62. Socialist members of the party are paid \$1.50 a day from party funds. The managing editor of the Vorwarts, moreover, receives an annual salary of \$1,800, the associate editors \$1,200, the editorial staff \$600. The authors of official Socialist pamphlets likewise receive payment for their work. The party, besides, keeps up at least a trained corps of professional agitators to bring recruits to the party ranks. These agitators travel periodically from the industrial centres; thus, for instance, from Hamburg they are sent to Cologne, Hanover and other places. The greatest difficulties of the Socialist leaders had to overcome the war was to secure halls for their gatherings. They used great pressure on res-
