The hearing of the case Rex. vs. Cantwell and Gill, was continued yesterday before Chief Justice Sir Wm. Horwood and the following jury: Thomas Bates, G. H. Cook, John A. Williams, W. H. Bowden, Patrick Foley, E. R. Pippy, S. Sellars, W. Casey, Alex. Ross, George Snow, W. Ewing, A. Parsons. The examination of witnesses for the Crown, and the accused in their own behalf, occupied the attention of the Court until 3 p.m., when Mr. Higgins, K.C., for the accused, addressed the jury for over an hour and a half. Mr. Higgins' adlocal courts, and a strong plea on hehalf of accused Mr. L. E. Emerson for the Crown, followed, and reviewed the evidence for and against the prisoners at length, concluding at 6 p.m., when recess was taken until 7.30. On resuming, His Lordship the Chief Justice charged the jury, and in doing so directed their attention to the evidence as it had been given, and as to their part in rendering a verdict. Just before nine o'clock the jury retired. At midnight they returned to Court, and through their foreman, Mr. T. Bates, announced that they had found both accused "Not Guilty."
