H. J. WATTS, H.M.C. (H. F. SHORTIS.)

By the death of H. J. Watts of H M. Customs, which occurred on Saturday evening, St. John's has lost a most respected citizen, and the Public Service a most efficient and popular

H. J. Watts was born in Harbon

Grace 76 years ago, and was the eldest son of the late Claudius Watts, who at the time of his demise had nearly rounded off the century. He received his education at the famous Grammar School in that town, and after leaving that institution, he was employed for a short time in the employ of W. H. Thompson, Anglo Telegraph operator and druggist. About 1870, Mr. Watts left his native town and travelled extensively in the United Thanksgiving the hunger of the masses for good States and Canada. He went as far west as the Rocky Mountains, and was engaged in various employments in towns of both countries.
